#### TAFF DEADLINE EXTENDED

Suzanne "Suzle" Tompkins (North American Administrator) and Bridget "Bug" Bradshaw (UK Administrator) have announced that the nomination deadline for the 2008 TransAtlantic Fan Fund race <taff.org.uk> has been extended from 16 July until 30 July to allow last minute candidates to get their paperwork and nominators.

The 2008 TAFF race will select a representative to travel from North America to attend Orbital 2008 <a href="https://www.orbital2008.org">www.orbital2008.org</a>, the Eastercon (UK national convention) to be held 21–24 March 2008 near Heathrow Airport in London, England. Candidates for the race must provide five nominations from known fans (three North American, two European); a written platform, not to exceed 101 words; and a pledge that you will take the trip if you win (along with a nominal \$20 performance bond).

The June meeting of the North Alabama Science Fiction Association was called to order on Saturday, June 16, 2007 in the BookMark meeting room at 6:18:15P by President Mary Ortwerth.

There was a digression about pieces of technology, like cell phones and air conditioning, that only become necessities after you own them.

#### **OLD BUSINESS**

## **SPACE CAMP HALL OF FAME**

As part of their celebration of the 25th Anniversary of Space Camp, the U. S. Space & Rocket Center inducted eight members into the newly created Space Camp Hall of Fame. The SCHoF is intended to honor graduates, former employees, and supporters of Space Camp. The ceremony was emceed by William Shatner, the evening of Wednesday 13 June 2007 at the Von Braun Center.

Perhaps fittingly, the first inductee was Dr. Wernher von Braun (accepted by Huntsville Astronaut Jan Davis on behalf of the von Braun family). Von Braun is credited with conceiving the idea for Space Camp during a discussion with former Space & Rocket Center CEO Ed Buckbee. Other inductees included:

About an hour before dawn one morning, I launch into the air and start flying north along the eastern side of the mountains. Something is shaking the ground, and it is not my heart! The sound stops. Then I hear a different sound... a waterfall... and then all is quiet, again. I am near the bottom of a steep gully which descends down toward the still-distant frozen bay. The air carries no untoward scent... just water and minerals and bark and... fish? Definitely fish.

Thump Ump Ump ump ump... Thump Ump Ump ump ump... Thump Ump Ump ump ump...

The noise starts again, closer, and stops. The lower end of the gully is blocked by a tower... no, two towers. Two leaning towers... Two... *Hairy*... Towers!

I'd say that the likelihood of any media personality ever making it to Con†Stellation is small. On a small number of occasions we've had such a person express what seemed to be genuine, personal interest in coming but it's not worked out to date. We can't pay the appearance fees they would normally command and can't promise much (if anything) in the way of autograph income. Yep, Alabama is in the Central time zone. Many Easterners don't seem to realize that the largest geographical slice of the

contiguous US is in the Central zone. There are more states in the Eastern zone, but only because so many of them are quite small (geographically) compared to the rest of the country. Um, I guess we weren't clear about Embraer — it's an aircraft manufacturer (regional jets) not an airline. As for zines online, I'd think that the majority of them are in PDF format for which free readers are commonly available for all "modern" computers. (I have several old computers around the house that run obsolete operating systems.
