(Unless there is a large nearby convention being held that weekend—in which case we often move the meeting to the second or fourth weekend.) The regular meeting location is the Community Room at the Balmoral branch of Renasant Bank (off Airport Road, near the Parkway). The Executive Committee meeting (if scheduled) is at 5P. Oscar Puts the *Hurt* on *Avatar*

It was not the best of nights for genre films. The 82nd Academy Awards (given by the Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences <www.oscars.org>), were presented Sunday 7 March 2010. The big winner was non-genre The Hurt Locker which took home six trophies, including both top honors—Best Director and Best Picture.

The Hurt Locker beat genre box-office juggernaut Avatar in categories where both were nominated 5 to 1 (with a single category going to neither). HL also edged out another genre nominee, Up, in a category where Avatar was not nominated-Original Screenplay. The only actor nominated for genrerelated work (Stanley Tucci, The Lovely Bones) also lost to a non-genre nominee (Christoph Waltz, *Inglourious Basterds*) in the Supporting Actor category.

Blasting past all those negatives, genre movies did win in seven categories. Avatar lead this pack with three wins, for Art Direction (Rick Carter, Robert Stromberg, and Kim Sinclair), Cinematography (Mauro Fiore), and Visual Effects (Joe Letteri, Stephen Rosenbaum, Richard Baneham, and Andrew R. Jones).

Animated Up did respectably also, with wins in both the Original Score (Michael Giacchino) and Animated Feature categories. Star Trek took one statue—Best Makeup (Barney Burman, Mindy Hall, and Joel Harlow). The Animated Short category was won by Logorama, a quirky film wherein the world is composed of corporate logos and mascots.

Awards Roundup

TRANNIES, TOO DOMINATES RAZZIES

In contrast to their twin awards, the Oscars, the 30th annual Golden Raspberry Awards <www.razzies.com> (for the Worst Achievements in Film) were quite "nice" to genre films. We leave it as an exercise to the reader to determine whether the Oscars or the Razzies are the Evil Twin.

Genre films took five out of nine of this year's "awards" led by Transformers: Revenge Of The Fallen, aka Transformers 2 which took Worst Screenplay, Worst Director, and the "coveted" Worst Picture of 2009. Two other genre films "won" a single Raspberry, with G.I. Joe: The Rise of Cobra walking away with Worst Supporting Actress (Sienna Miller) and Land of The Lost copping Worst Prequel, Remake, Rip-off, or Sequel.

In addition to the annual awards, the Golden Raspberry Award Foundation this year chose a set of three "30th Razzieversary" awards that also had a decidedly genre bent. Battlefield Earth was chosen as Worst Picture of the Decade, Eddie Murphy was selected Worst Actor of the Decade, and Paris Hilton was named Worst Actress of the Decade. Several of both Murphy's and Hilton's cited "achievements" are clearly genre, including The Adventures of Pluto Nash, Meet Dave, House of Whacks, and Repo! The Genetic Opera.

One of the non-genre highlights of this year's Razzies ceremony was Sandra Bullock showing up to accept her Razzies for Worst Actress and half of Worst Screen Couple—both for All About Steve. Bullock became the first person to win a Razzie and an Oscar in the same year when she took home the Leading Actress Oscar for her role in *The Blind Side* the very next day.

On 21 February 2010 the British Academy of Film and Television Arts <www.bafta.org> announced the 2009 winners of the movie-category BAFTAs. Just like the Oscars, the big winner was non-genre The Hurt Locker. Three genre films, however, did win a total of five awards. Up took the BAFTAs for Animated Film and Music. Avatar won in the Production Design and Special Visual Effects categories. The BAFTA for Outstanding Debut by a British Writer, Director, or Producer went to director Duncan Jones for *Moon*.
