

She Dances in the Stars

Jeanne Robinson—dancer, choreographer, author, Soto Zen monk, and one of the sweetest people you could have met died 30 May after a long struggle with biliary cancer. She had been in palliative care since early last April.

Jeanne (1948–2010) was co-author with husband Spider Robinson of the Stardance stories, the first novella of which ("Stardance," 1977) won the Hugo, Nebula, and Locus Awards. Jeanne was well known on her own as a dancer and choreogra-

pher, having created more than 30 works in the latter capacity.

Many folks in Huntsville had a chance to get to know Jeanne at least a little as she accompanied Spider when he was GoH at Con[†] Stellation XIII, Musca, in 1994. She will be missed by all who knew her.

HUGO PACKET RELEASED

Aussiecon 4, the 68th World Science Fiction Convention, has continued the still-fairly-new tradition of working with nominees and their publishers to compile many of the Hugonominated works for electronic distribution to voters. That packet is now available to members of the current Worldcon.

To be eligible to vote (and to get the Hugo Voter Packet), you must be a supporting or attending member of Aussiecon 4 before the voting deadline of 31 July 2010 23:59 PDT. For more information on the packet, email <hugoadmin@aussiecon4. org.au>.

SITE SELECTION HAS HUNTSVILLE CONNECTION

This year's Worldcon Site Selection vote (for the 2012 site) has connection to Huntsville—the US address for mail-in votes is here in town.

Site Selection voting is only by mail and onsite at the convention. Voters can either print a ballot from the PDF online at <www.aussiecon4.org.au/files/234.pdf> or use one from the upcoming Progress Report 3. The deadline for receipt of mailin ballots is 31 July 2010. Onsite votes can be hand-carried.

Chicago is the only committee to file paperwork in time to

be on the ballot and are very likely to win in a walk against any possible write-in candidate(s). Voting can still important, though, if for no other reason than it's the least expensive way to get a membership in the 2010 Worldcon.

NASFIC TO HOST AWARDS

Heard around the web: Two of the award ceremonies normally held at Worldcon are to be at the NASFiC in Raleigh NC instead. With Worldcon in Australia this year, both the Golden Ducks (juried awards for children's and young adult sf books) and the Chesleys (peer awards by the Association of Science Fiction and Fantasy Artists <www.asfa-art.org>) are said to be headed for ReConStruction <www.reconstructionsf.org>.

DISNEY NIXES STAR WARS RIDES

After 20 years, the *Star Wars*-themed Star Tours motionsimulator rides at both Disneyland and Disney World are slated to be shut down. The Disneyland version closes 27 July 2010 and the Disney World version shutters on 8 September.

By May 2011 Disney plans to open in their places... drum roll please... Star Wars-themed motion-simulator rides. In 3-D.

The existing rides take one in a simulated space ship that strays from it's appointed rounds (to the Moon of Endor) into the middle of a battle between the Rebel Alliance and the Death Star. The new version will strap you into a pod race on Tatooine.

If you have a yen to celebrate the existing ride before its voice is suddenly silenced you could consider heading to Orlando during the 12-15 August media con Star Wars Celebration V <www.starwarscelebration.com>. They are hooked up with Disney World to help the latter sell tickets to a "Last Tour to Endor party" on Saturday evening 14 August. Click through the con website at <www.starwarscelebration.com/Disney> to get to the Disney website where you can pay your \$75 (plus tax) for the 5-hour party. Note that this does not include admission to the con itself (adult day rates \$48-\$54; 4-day ticket \$128) or autographs (\$20-\$50).

E-BOOK SALES REPORTED UP

The American Association of Publishers <www.publishers. org> has reported surging e-book sales for 2009 and the first quarter of 2010.

In 2009, e-book sales were up by over 175% year-over-year (in total dollars of sales) and, for the first time, surpassed audiobooks in sales volume. Total book sales were off a calculated 1.8% for that year.

For the first quarter of 2010, e-books were up more than 250% over the same period a year ago. Total book sales saw something of a rebound, up 8% over the year-ago quarter.

What I Did On My Summer Vacation To ConCarolinas 2010/DeepSouthCon 48

(Even Though It's Not Summer Yet) by Sam Smith

Just a few notes on this year's ConCarolinas 2010/Deep-SouthCon 48, held 4–6 June 2010 in Charlotte, North Carolina.

Judy, Sue Thorn, and I left Way Too Early Friday morning, around 4:30A, to drive straight through to the con. We made extremely good time, arriving around 1:30P Charlotte time. I'll not bore anyone with the details of the trip, especially since I slept through most of it.

The hotel was a Hilton, with a very professional, well mannered staff. Everything we asked for from the hotel was given very quickly, and it was all "Yes, Sir," "No, Sir" throughout.

The hotel backs up to a shopping complex similar

to Bridge Street in *DSC photos courtesy of Sam Smith* Huntsville. (Expensive, trendy shops, outdoors, lake, swans, etc.) The program book lists 23 restaurants nearby, broken down by location: "Within walking distance," "The Shoppes at University Place," "Short drive."

Once we were settled in at the hotel, we sallied forth seeking lunch. We settled on the nearby Cheddar's, to see if it was like the one in Huntsville. It was. Exact same layout, exact same



menu, exact same marginal service, at least at first. Initially we were seated at a booth where water was dripping down from the ceiling (air conditioning condensation). We moved ourselves, which may have confused them. Once the waitress took our order, however, the food arrived swiftly. I ordered one of their skillet cookies (which is cooked fresh when you order it), so as to have it ready when I had finished eating the main meal. I finished eating the main meal. No cookie. A few minutes into wondering what had happened a manager came over to apologize—they had burned the cookie! Judy and Sue started laughing as I told him to "Bring it on! I like burned food." He left, brought it back, I sampled it and pronounced it fine, so he took it back and dressed it (ice cream and whipped cream), and Judy, Sue, and I enjoyed it.

Once we got back to the hotel, we started locating stuff. The bulk of the hotel's function space is in the basement. My initial impression on going downstairs was that half the function space was given over to gaming. Upon later reflection, it probably wasn't half, but it was a lot.

The consuite, however, was up one floor on the main lobby level. The consuite was, well, lame is the best face I can think of to put on it. 3-liter generic sodas, generic cookies, napkins, and a big box of plastic forks was what you would find there most of the time. Occasionally there would be pasta. Just pasta. No sauce, no cheese, just plain cooked pasta. I was told later that this was the first time ConCarolinas had even had a consuite, so I guess I'll credit them with a good first effort. If they plan to continue having a consuite, however, I would certainly recommend that they check out the consuites of conventions with a reputation for good consuiteage. Like LibertyCon, or our own Con†Stellation. At least the consuite was a good place to gather to play Spades.

We attended Opening Ceremonies Friday evening. Opening Ceremonies solidified my initial impression that ConCarolinas is heavily media and gaming oriented (not that there's anything

wrong with that, mind you, it's just not my usual taste). The house band, "This is Not the Band You Are Looking For," played. At Opening Ceremonies Richard Hatch was introduced, along with Bill Blair. John Ringo was in



attendance, and was also introduced. There were some other introductions. I don't think Jerry Pournelle, the Writer Guest of Honor, was in attendance yet.

Looking at it, the 80-odd page program book is about half filled with guest bios, broken down into categories: Guests of Honor, Special Media Guests, Special Writer Guest, Special Paranormal Guests, Master of Ceremonies, Musical Guests, Dance Performers, Literary Guests, Film/Media Guests, Gaming Guests, Paranormal Guests, Fandom Guests, Comic/ Graphic Novel Guests, Art Guests, Filk Guests. Wow!

The dealers room was large and contained pretty much "the usual": Gaming dealers, T-Shirt dealers, book dealers, costumers, etc. There were also tables where the various media guests could set up their promotions. The first time I wandered through I found four things I considered buying. On Sunday I remembered what one of them was, so that's the one I bought.

There were three room parties that I made it to Friday night.

(The Con†Stellation room party had to be canceled, since our main party organizer had to drop out at the literal last minute.) I'm trying to remember who had parties that night. I know the DSC 50 bid had a party. There was another party on that floor and another one floor up. The DSC 50 party had really good food, and lots of it, so that made an impression. (Sorry about that, guys, maybe I should have picked up a flier.) I saw the next morning that somebody had tried to have a room party up on the 8th floor, but it had been shut down. I guess they take "party floor" seriously at this hotel.

I made it to the Doctor panel, Who where the topic was "The New Doctor Will See You Now!" This



panel was lots of fun. Lots of geeking out about the new Doctor. Lots of "Did you notice such-and-such in this episode?" (During such discussions, several members of the audience, and one member of the panel, would pull up the episode in question on their laptop and look up what it was we were talking about. After I got home, I also had to look a couple of things up that had been discussed. DVRs are a lovely invention.)

After the Doctor Who panel were the Phoenix and Rebel awards. It was also at this panel that we found out the total attendance of the convention was around 1300, which is apparently a major increase over their usual attendance.

The winner of the Phoenix award was Dr. Jerry Pournelle. The winner of the Rebel award was Albin Johnson, one of the founders of the 501st



Legion. The Rubble was awarded to Uncle Timmy, either because "He's been runner-up so often we finally had to give it to him" or because "It's all Uncle Timmy's fault!"



While we were waiting

for the Phoenix and Rebel awards ceremony to begin, there was a photo-op with a pink RT unit that I had seen wandering around the convention. I found out later that this was R2-KT, a droid commissioned after Albin Johnson's daughter Katie passed away from brain cancer in 2005.

Once the Phoenix and Rebel award ceremonies were over, we went in search of lunch (passing by the Carolina Ghostbusters and ECTO-3A on our way out). Lunch was at the Texas Land & Cattle Steak House, where they have an excellent peach bread pudding, and an interesting policy that if you can't make up your mind about a cut of meat they will cook you up a sample and bring it to you!

The charity auction overran its time slot Saturday night. I didn't see anything I was interested in, since most of what was on offer appeared to be stuff people had donated that had been lying around their house. The few gems, however, did go for high prices.

There was a Masquerade. It had 30 or so entries. Most were very good. The Carolina Ghostbusters entered, and performed the entire classic "We're ready to believe you!" speech from the movie. For me the most memorable entrant was a group that had a credible David Tennant Doctor, a credible Donna in a wedding dress, a credible Rory in his bachelor party getup, and a random catgirl. The skit revolved around Rory being confused by a redhead in a wedding dress traveling with the Doctor. (If you don't get BBC America, or have access to the new Matt Smith Doctor Who episodes, you have no idea what I'm talking about, do you?)

Three more room parties Saturday Night, including an encore by the DSC 50 bid. One of the other parties was by Fen-Con in Texas, promoting their paring with DSC 49 next year. I believe the third was a StellarCon party.

Sunday morning, Way Too Early, was the SFC meeting. Here I believe the ConCarolinas folks were just a bit confused, like so many others. The program book just listed one meeting, two hours long, under the title "DeepSouthCon Meeting." The Southern Fandom Confederation is a separate organization. (I also noticed that the ConCarolinas program book did not include a copy of the DSC Bylaws, which is incorrect, according to the Bylaws.)

At the SFC meeting, there was some actual business discussed. I'll not attempt to reproduce anything remotely resembling minutes here, I'll just record the highlights:

- There had been no real action on the part of the T-Shirt committee. (I didn't remember that there was a T-Shirt committee.) Rather than drag things out by trying to have a T-Shirt design contest, which was their original intent, Warren Buff opined that we should change the plan to "pick an artist and run."
- For the new edition of the SFC Handbook, Mike Rogers reported that he had made some progress, and that he wanted to turn it into an e-project instead of a paper one. He considered a Wiki, but ultimately rejected the idea. The current plan is for him to get with Sam Smith (since Sam is hosting the current web-based edition of the 1997 SFC Handbook) and see about setting up a new site for a new handbook. (Which will then turn into sort of an ongoing project, if my impression is correct.)
- Reports: There was a report from Tom Feller (SFC Secretary). There was no report from Janet Hopkins (SFC Treasurer).
- Elections: Lacking a report from the Treasurer, there was some discussion about replacing Janet, which ultimately resulted in G. Patrick Molloy being "convinced" to take on the job on at least an interim basis. The SFC officers are now: President Warren Buff, Vice-President Mike Rogers, Secretary Tom Feller, and Treasurer G. Patrick Molloy.



The DSC meeting was sort and sweet, though since the Moon Princesses' DSC 50 bid was running unopposed I did threaten to throw together a last minute rival Huntsville bid, "just to confuse things." Toni Weisskopf put the kibosh on that idea real quick, though, by telling me "You do that, and you'll be running a DeepSouthCon!" No thanks Toni. Been there, done that.

Needless to say, the Moon Princesses won, and DSC 50 will be in Huntsville Alabama. Hotel TBD.

We then played more Spades, and left for home. Nine hours later, we were back. Overall, a good trip, and a good con. Now I'm going to go find a cookie.

The 2009 Nebula Awards were announced and presented at the Nebula Awards Banquet held at the Hilton Cocoa Beach Oceanfront 15 May 2010. (Unlike many awards, the Nebulas are dated for the eligibility year, not the year of presentation.) The Nebulas—among the most prestigious peer genre awards—are voted on by active members of the Science Fiction and Fantasy Writers of America <www.sfwa.org>. The winners are:

Awards Roundup

AWARDS AT CONGRÈS BORÉAL

It's awards time for some of our neighbors to the north (some of whom might be happy to live in the 5th département d'outre-mer).

The Prix Boréal is an official part of the Congrès Boréal (<www.congresboreal.ca>, a French-language sf/f convention in Montréal). Winners this year were:

In The Deep Woods

No Need for a Ring—Chapter 31 by PieEyedDragon

[Editor's Note: This is the fourth chapter in the third part of the NNFAR series—The Thing Goes South—and is thus numbered as Chapter 4 in some places. The Shuttle is serializing the entire tale and chooses to use the alternate sequential chapter numbering system.]

It's the twentieth of August; and the moon is full. I'm full of fire. I'm full of magic. I'm too full of cramps to fly; and bleeding like mad! I was going to leave three days ago; now this, again. Half of Durin's Tower is stained dark red. Water still flows from the endless stair and out across the other half. The cold west wind on the heights at least dries these awkward fluids. Everything... stinks. I pity anything downwind.

After four more days, I finally launch. I glide easily around to the south side of this mountain. Down, down toward Dimrill Dale, below the sealed (by me) eastern door (and windows) of Khazad-dúm, and then onward to Kheled-zâram: the hallowed Mirrormere. I plunge into the water, and begin a very thorough bath.

Later, around noon, I climb out and look back into the water and see only stars. My golden star is there, too. I turn then and follow along the Silverlode southeast, until it turns more east as Celebrant and toward the tall, golden Mallorn trees of Lothlórien; empty, and very tree-ish. The formerly resident Elves were Silvan Elves. They moved to southern Greenwood with Celeborn, or Ithilien with Legolas, or both. Following the memories of Galadriel, I turn north from the river, into the trees of the Naith; and find my way directly to the hill of Cerin Amroth. The sun has set, so I curl around the greener area at the top: the grave of Arwen. I sleep, and I dream.

After three days, I wake fully refreshed. I go deeper into the woods of Caras Galadhon until I go round a hill and descend into a clear, garden area. Relatively clear, that is. It seems a bit overgrown. Beside a very large tree there is a stream, a tarnished silver vase, and a tarnished "bird bath." This, then, is the Mirror of Galadriel! The Stones can reveal what *is*, and what *was*. This artifact is more dangerous. It can show the *is* and the *was*, too; but with added uncertainty so that what *shall be*, or at least what *may be*, is also revealed. One can seldom tell whether what one sees is past, present, or "may be." There was much philosophical conjecture along these lines back in Old Atlantis. Some held that you could not know *the* future without locking yourself into a state of predestination. Others contended that the future grew out of the present, and every decision point created at least two *possible* futures. I've always leaned toward the latter theory.

I'm going to look. I consider the risk to be justified. I fill the vase and then fill the basin. I breathe my misty breath upon it and wait for the waters to still. I see a mountain and a long lake. There are many boats. A Man surfaces near the boats, gasping, with a long black arrow clenched in his teeth. I see also dragons fighting. Many dragons, at least three, tearing each other to bits. None of them are me. I see the land as from a great height. In the same view are the local "sun" and "moon." In a strong keep, surrounded by horses, I see a banner upon the wall. It is a red banner with a black serpent. As I look, I see that the red area is actually red sand. The serpent has stubby legs and vestigial wings. It is a dragon! I see now an elf with a worn face lined with sorrow and pain. He holds a harp in his scarred hand. The imprint of Galadriel recognizes her half-cousin: Maglor, the singer; the tenderhearted, the accursed second son of Fëanor. The brothers had made war upon anyone and everyone who stood between them and the Silmarils wrought by their father. Finally holding one in his hand, it had burned him for all his evil deeds. So he cast it into the sea and began wandering, the only one of the seven brothers to survive beyond the First Age. I behold a cave of treasures: all gems and silver and... silver? There is no sign of any smallest trace of gold. Again I see horses. They are bearing riders that pursue a herd of massive cattle. Fires leap up from the grass around them. I see... myself. Shadowed, I am curled around a large white tree. I see ships with black sails. They tilt and slide, stern first, into the deep.

At this point I am interrupted by an arrow. A real arrow strikes my neck... and bounces off.

I look up and around. I see no one. There are many tall trees around the garden. Nothing moves. I pick up the arrow and examine it. The broad metal blade's point is blunted. Sniffing at the notched end and the fletching, I detect the scent of Man. A quick taste confirms this. This arrow was no threat to me, so I toss it aside.

I consider the arrow in the vision. I knew that arrow; and so does Smaug! I had meant to collect it later for... certain usages. Do I turn north right away and try to get it? No. I must keep to my original course. Someone here is watching me. Their arrows cannot harm me. I shall ignore them. I head back

to the Silverlode and enter the water. There is no taint here. I shall continue on down this until I reach the great river, Anduin.

Behind me, a cloaked figure drops from the trees and picks up the blunted arrow, then begins to follow.
