
meeting. There will be a dinner break between the concom meeting and the club meeting.

WE'RE NUMBER 3!

In Forbes Magazine's 10th annual ranking of the topearning dead celebrities <www.tinyurl.com/TopDead>, the sf/ f/h genre got some props with J.R.R. Tolkien coming in 3rd behind only Michael Jackson and Elvis Presley. Almost a half-million copies of Tolkien titles sold in the period counted, possibly spurred by the run-up to the movie adaptation of The Hobbit.

Two other arguably-genre-related figures also placed on the list. Charles Schulz (Peanuts) came in 4th, in part because an 80% share of the cartoon archive and character rights changed hands during the year. Theodor Geisel, better known as Dr. Seuss, took the 7th spot, with income from such sources as iPhone apps and an attraction at Orlando's Universal Studios theme park.

ANNUAL E-BOOK SALES NEAR \$1,000,000,000


Forrester Research has released their latest report on the state of eBook sales. Combing info from a published excerpt <www.tinyurl.com/eBooksĬBil> and news reports, notable Forrester's poll findings and projections include:

- 2010 US sales of eBooks are expected to reach \$966 million
- 2015 US sales of eBooks are projected to rise to \$2.8 billion.
- Only 7 percent 7% of online adults who read books read eBooks, and nearly 50% of those don't own a dedicated eBook reader.
- The average eBook reader consumes 41% of books in digital form. For those that own a dedicated eBook reader (Kindle, etc.), that jumps to 66%.
- The top devices used for reading eBooks are (in order) laptop computers, the Kindle, iPhones, the Sony eReader, and netbook computers

Judges for this year were Greg Ketter, Kelly Link, Jim Minz, Jürgen Snoeren, and Gary K. Wolfe The winners are:

WSFA SMALL PRESS AWARD ANNOUNCED

The winner of the 2010 Washington Science Fiction Association <www.wsfa.org> Small Press Award for Short Fiction was also announced at Capclave. Tansy Rayner Roberts <www.tansyrr.com> got the nod for "Siren Beat," (Roadkill/Siren Beat, Twelfth Planet). Roberts was not present to receive the award in person, but Alisa Krasnostein, representing publisher Twelfth Planet Press, was there to accept for her.

ENDEAVOUR AWARD WINNER

The winner of this year's Endeavour Award www.osfci.org/endeavour (for a "distinguished Science Fiction or Fantasy book written by a Pacific Northwest author or authors and published in the previous year") was announced at Orycon 32 www.orycon.org/orycon32 (12–14 November 2010 at the Portland Doubletree Hotel in Portland OR). The award went to **David Marusek** for *Mind Over Ship*.

GALAXY NATIONAL BOOK AWARDS 2010

There are now two sets of awards claiming the title National Book Awards. Of course, they are for different nations.

The new UK version recently gave it's inaugural awards, styled the *Galaxy* National Book Awards due to the sponsorship of Galaxy Chocolate. Several genre works were nominated, though none took home a prize. Genre author Sir Terry Pratchett, did take home one of two Lifetime Achievement Awards. Pratchett is quoted as saying "I'm amazed. You find something that you like doing, and do well, and keep on doing it, and suddenly they give you an award when all I really was doing was having lots of fun."

ROWLING COPS ANOTHER PRIZE

J.K. Rowling won the inaugural Hans Christian Andersen Literature Prize, presented 19 October 2010 in Andersen's home town of Odense, Denmark. Rowling was there to accept the adjudicated prize, which honors a writer "whose work can be compared to that of Andersen." The award includes a plaque and a cash prize of 500,000 Kroner (over \$90,000).

PEOPLE'S CHOICE NOMS

Nominations for the 2011 People's Choice Awards have been released. Winners will be announced at a 5 January 2011 CBS-TV broadcast. Selection is by popular vote, either on the web www.peopleschoice.com/pca/vote or via Twitter.

Sf/f/h genre movies and TV shows are pretty well represented, coping (for instance) all 5 noms in the Favorite Movie category. Three genre films led the pack with 3 nods apiece: *Inception* (Movie, Drama Movie, On Screen Team), *Iron Man* 2 (Movie, Action Movie, On Screen Team), and *The Twilight Saga: Eclipse* (Movie, Drama Movie, On Screen Team).

Four more genre works pulled down two nominations each: *Alice in Wonderland* (Movie, Drama Movie), *Toy Story 3* (Movie, Family Movie), *True Blood* (Sci-Fi/Fantasy Show, TV Obsession), and *The Vampire Diaries* (TV Drama, Sci-Fi/Fantasy Show).

Sixteen genre items—plus one more related-but-not-really-genre movie—were each recognized in one category. The not-quite move was *Kick-Ass*, which got an Action Movie nom. The longer list comprises: *The Crazies* (Horror Movie), *Despicable Me* (Family Movie), *The Event* (New TV Drama), *Family Guy* (TV Family), *Fringe* (Sci-Fi/Fantasy Show), *How to Train Your Dragon* (Family Movie), *The Last Exorcism* (Horror Movie), *Let Me In* (Horror Movie), *A Nightmare on Elm Street* (Horror Movie), *No Ordinary Family* (New TV Comedy), *Prince of Persia: The Sands of Time* (Action Movie), *Resident Evil: Afterlife* (Horror Movie), *Shrek Forever After* (Family Movie), *The Simpsons* (TV Family), *Smallville* (Sci-Fi/Fantasy Show), and *Supernatural* (Sci-Fi/Fantasy Show).

Duty and the Beast

No Need for a Ring—Chapter 33 by PieEyedDragon

[Editor's Note: This is the sixth chapter in the third part of the NNFAR series—*The Thing Goes South*—and is thus numbered as Chapter 6 in some places. The *Shuttle* is serializing the entire tale and chooses to use the alternate sequential chapter numbering system.]

Captain Bergil was not exactly old, not like his uncle Iorlas who was not expected to survive another winter. Like his father, Beregond, his strong Numenorian bloodline had given him more than just a little more height than most men. Nearing seven score years of age, he could still ride the paths that linked the beacon sites, though no longer ride to battles far afield from his family's place in Ithilien.

He started by checking the placement of the beacon-wood and then took a few steps toward the Veil before stopping dead! There was an unfamiliar mound of something on the other side! As he watched, a long neck raised upwards and two large glowing eyes looked straight at him!

Bergil bolted! Running down the path as safely as urgency permitted, he reached the station and commanded the men to scatter for their lives. The one word, "Dragon!," put all their questions on hold. King's messengers from the far north had recently ridden through Rohan bearing news from Annúminas to Minas Tirith. That news included reports of sightings of a small, green dragon; an uncharacteristically benign one, too! One who ate fish and burned neither fields nor homes. One who even, unbelievably, had turned the old story lines sidewise and rescued an Elven princess! This beast was darker too, maybe.

He was suddenly reminded of the old King, Elessar. Bergil was one of few remaining who remembered the end of Sauron and the Return of the King. The greatest heroes of that tale were also most unlikely; being Halflings. Or, as they called themselves, Hobbits. Bergil had spent much time with one of them, Master Took, who had ridden into the city with the Wizard. Who had brought him there to keep him away from something found at Orthanc, a Seeing-Stone!

Bergil paused before mounting his horse. He had seen something else on the mountain, besides the beast. Three somethings. Two at least matched the description of the Palantír of Orthanc. The third had looked much the same but was... larger. He stepped away from his horse, breathing slowly to gather that inner calm. The others would spread the word. He was a Captain of the Royal Signal Corps. On the chance that those really were seeing-stones he had a duty to try and get a better look and report, if he could. Maybe the Veil would keep the dragon away.

It is now the twenty-second of September. Happy birthday to the late Bilbo and Frodo Baggins. Time to wake up. An old man is staring at me. He then runs away. I stretch and take thought on my next tasks. Some time later, I become aware of being watched. At the far western edge of the hilltop I notice grey hair and a pair of bright eyes. The man keeps very still. I give him a highly exaggerated wink. He slowly rises and walks as far as the edge of the veil. His eyes dart back and forth between looking at me, and looking at the Stones. I've been wondering how to get the Stones into the hands of the Gondorians. Only the two smaller ones for now. I need the larger one for a final task. Was this meeting simple chance, or had the Valar sent him up here?

This man surely knows, as do I, that speaking is forbidden up here. But I have at hand means for communication without it, and without tearing out all of his memories. He looks vaguely familiar. Well, he had decided to learn what he could. As far as he could tell, this stone possessed the abilities of what it seemed to be. The dragon was still waiting, an attribute of the kind, and reptiles in general.

Too, the purely linear structure of a 2+ hour recording makes it hard to find the bits one might be interested in. In a way, it's the equivalent of a printed zine that might contain some really good stuff but there are no page numbers and the font is difficult to read... the structure gets in the way of the content. There's a link on their front page that should stay there for some time since they add new blog entires only occasionally. -ED]
