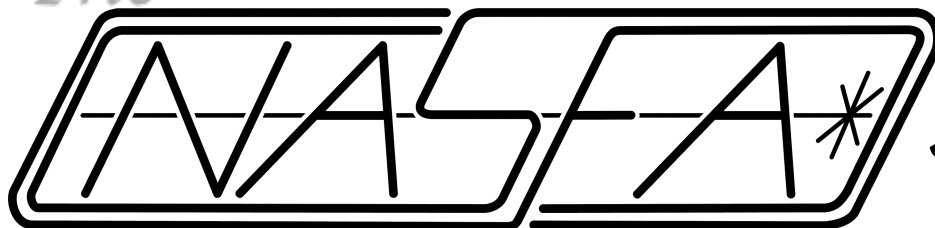

The next **NASFA Meeting** will be **Saturday 14 July 2012** at the Madison campus of Willowbrook Baptist Church (old Wilson Lumber Company building) at **7105 Highway 72W** (aka University Drive). Note that this is the 2nd Saturday, **one week earlier than usual** (due to LibertyCon) and **not** at the old Renasant Bank location. **Please see the sidebar at the bottom of page 2 for directions** to the new meeting location.

CONCOM MEETINGS

CHICON 7 ANNOUNCES FINAL RATE RISE

As of 1 August 2012, membership rates for Chicon 7 <www.chicon.org>—this year’s Worldcon, to be held 30 August–3 September 2012 in Chicago IL—will go up to their final level. Adult Attending memberships will bump up \$15 to \$230. Converting a Supporting Attending membership will go to \$180. Children (0–16) and YA (17–21) rates remain unchanged at \$75 and \$100 respectively. The Family Rate (2 adults plus 2 or more dependent children) will increase from \$540 to \$560.

Day rates have also been announced. The rates vary by day (Thursday through Monday) and class of admission (Adult, YA, Child). (Note that Chicon is not calling these memberships so presumably they do not come with rights to vote in Site Selection or attend the Business Meeting.) Those rates are: Adult, \$50 (Thu), \$70 (Fri, Sat, or Sun), and \$40 (Mon); YA \$30/40/20; and Child \$20/30/15.

AMAZON OFFERS TO BUY DORCHESTER

Dorchester Publishing, which has been sliding down the slope into oblivion for a couple of years, has received an offer from Amazon.com to buy it. An auction must still be held, but the likelihood of another bidder seems to be low. If the sale goes through, parties owed back royalties from Dorchester may be made whole in exchange for transferring DP’s contract rights to Amazon and throwing in ebook rights.

SETTLE PLANET BAEN

Baen Books has launched Planet Baen <www.planetbaen.net>—a web-based game set on “on a planet on the galactic frontier”—where you can win free ebooks from Baen by achieving various in-game goals. The game is integrated with Facebook, but you apparently are not required to be a Facebookie to play. Winnings are in the form of an ecoupon redeemable for any of a variety of books. Directions to Meeting

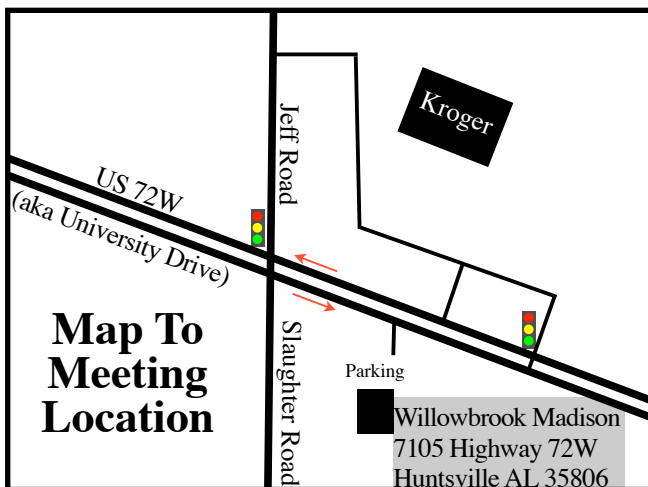
Willowbrook Madison is near the intersection of US 72W (aka University Drive closer to the center of Huntsville) and Slaughter Road (aka Jeff Road north of the intersection). This is in Huntsville, but close to the Madison city limit. Given that we have less than full control of the AC, it may be a little warmish in the building so you’re advised to dress accordingly.

Coming from the direction of Madison it’s an easy right turn from US 72 into the Willowbrook Madison parking lot, about 150 yards east of the intersection.

Coming from the direction of Huntsville things are a little trickier. US 72 is divided by a median and there’s no left turn from westbound 72 into Willowbrook Madison’s parking lot. The easiest/safest way is to turn right into the Kroger parking lot (either at the light *before* Slaughter/Jeff or at a second entrance about 100 yards later) and make your way through the parking lot to Jeff Road. Turn left onto Jeff, then left at the light onto US 72. Again, the right turn into the Willowbrook Madison parking lot is about 150 yards east of the intersection. Two notes of caution: (1) Jeff Road is undergoing major

roadwork, so watch for lane shifts, loose gravel, etc., and (2) You may not be able to see the Willowbrook Madison building (which is set back from the road) by the time you get to the turn into the Kroger parking lot.

be won depending on how far you level up and achieve goals. Those goals, per the official website, include “Adjust[ing] your political, economic, and moral outlook.” Many *Shuttle* readers may be familiar enough with Baen to have a clue what that means.

WANT TO OWN A SPACE SUIT?

A company by the name of Final Frontier Design <finalfrontierdesign.com> is proposing to design and build in-vehicle space suits for the variety of commercial space ventures now (pun intended) getting off the ground. In fact, they are already two generations in to their work and are now looking for money to kickstart their “3G Space Suit” effort using, well, kickstarter.com.

For those who may not be familiar, Kickstarter has become a Go To way of crowdsourcing funding—asking people to “invest” in a new idea. In the case of FFD’s appeal at <tinyurl.com/3GSSKS>, they are giving away various goodies ranging from a postcard (at the \$3 basic level) to a full space suit (at the \$10,000 “Interstellar Spaced Level”) to donors. As this article is being written the highest level with any donors is the \$550 “Zero Gravity Level” which nets the payee (among other things) a pair of anti-G pants similar to those worn by fighter jet pilots.

The funding drive runs only through 15 July, with a goal of \$20,000. The way Kickstarter works is that the money will only change hands if the goal is reached.

HOW ABOUT A SPACE SHIP?

If you get a space suit, how about a whole space ship to go with it?

The 24’ prop shuttlecraft *Galileo*—from the original *Star Trek* series—recently changed hands for north of \$70,000 in an auction handled by Kiko Online Auctions. According to a story in the *Canton Repository* <bit.ly/LGw6wE> the price shot up at the end of the auction “as three late bidders fought to claim the structure.” Some parts are missing, others are included in the sale but not yet reattached. The previous owner was less than halfway along in a restoration project when (per the auction site) his or her “goals [...] changed and [she/he now] desires immediate sale.”

The reimagined one-hour dramedy reportedly has Herman as a zombie constantly in need of bodily repair. Perhaps production company Universal Television couldn’t find an actor of the Fred Gywnne’s stature. Look for it (if you dare) as a midseason starter for the 2012–13 season.

June Minutes

The June meeting of the North Alabama Science Fiction Association was called to order on Sunday, June 17, 2012 at DeepSouthCon 50 in the Madison room of the Huntsville Embassy Suites hotel at 3:37:45P by President Mary Lampert, who used a water bottle as a gavel. Crickets were left at home. [Using editorial prerogative, I’ll note that we thank DSC for letting us use this room. -ED]

OLD BUSINESS

NEW BUSINESS

We lost the Renasant Bank meeting room. The bank is remodeling and the meeting room is going away. They are only honoring their room reservations until the end of June. The club discussed options for a replacement meeting location.

According to Mike K., meeting rooms at local public libraries would require much earlier meeting times [if on a Saturday], and reservations can be taken six months in advance. The Star Market meeting room is no longer there. It is probably not possible to use a meeting room at Teledyne Brown, because Mike K. or Doug would have to be at any meeting we would have there. Wyman noted that UAH has three meeting rooms, but they close early during the summer months. Doug could ask his father to check at UAH for more information.

Sam reported that Willowbrook Baptist Church has a branch campus in Madison in the former Wilson’s Lumber building. (By the way, it’s almost within spitting distance of Haven Comics.) We can have it for free on Saturdays. It has a theater-style room with a seating capacity of 203, a large screen, one table, and “all the seats we can eat.” Sam has a key and the alarm code. There is one basic rule: leave it the way we found it. Card playing is apparently okay. (Judy asked.) It is available to host After-the-Meeting Meetings as well, although there are no kitchen facilities.

Doug moved that we hold the July NASFA meeting at the former Wilson’s Lumber building. Wyman seconded, and the motion passed many to two. Sam hasn’t asked if we can have someone other than him let us in. The church has a two year lease on the building.

There was more discussion of possible meeting locations. The Monte Sano hotel may have a place available for a nominal fee. Doug noted that a restaurant would want a significant number of people to buy dinner.

I don’t remember the context, but Ronnie mentioned a “retinal scan that looks into your soul.” Wyman discussed upcoming programming. We will have Les Johnson in August. Wyman asked Travis (who might have been sober) about having him and his father give a program, possibly in September, October, or November. Wyman has an idea for a Christmas program.

CON BUSINESS

Sam asked for a convention report. Mike K. reported that “we had a convention.” He also reported that the Con†Stella-

About 30 pros, fans, musicians, and groups were listed as Also Attending guests. The final attendance number is pending but is expected to be north of 500.

Many *Shuttle* readers will be aware that DeepSouthCon started in Huntsville, though DSC 1 (1963) was only retroactively called that (it had originally been called MidSouth-Con). Dave Hulan, who chaired that first DSC, was one of the Fan Guests of Honor at DSC 50; Larry Montgomery, who chaired DSC 2 and co-chaired DSC 3, was the other Fan GoH.

After DSC 1, Huntsville was also the site for DSC 4, DSC 23, DSC 25, and DSC 40. The last three of those were sponsored by NASFA. The cool thing about DSC 50 for us local NASFANs is that it was run by a committee drawn from across the Southeast so for the most part we could actually *go to stuff* at a Huntsville DeepSouthCon and not just *run stuff*. This is thanks in large part to the self-named Moon Princesses (Julie Wall, Toni Weisskopf, and Linda Zielke) whose loony idea it was to form the committee and start the bid three years ago.

I don't have the time I need to write a comprehensive review of the convention, but if I had to sum it up quickly I'd simply say "success." Any quibbles below are *very* minor and don't detract from that summary at all.

The venue worked well, though I think the hotel was shocked each morning at how much food the fans put away at the buffet breakfast that came free with the room. Function space was at one end of the ground floor and at both ends of the second floor. All rooms overlooked a 10-story atrium except for the few at one end whose view was blocked by the elevators. Speaking of those, they actually worked. That it, there was enough capacity (3 speedy, fairly-capacious cars) that one seldom had to wait more than a few moments. Parking was a slight problem; between local day-trippers and those who drove in from overflow hotels the parking lot was over capacity at some times. I know of at least one hotel guest who was told to park across the street at the Holiday Inn when the Embassy Suites ran out of slots.

The Art Show crammed a lot of high-quality work into a room a little too small. Department head (and NASFAN) Randy Cleary is to be congratulated both for the quality of the artists he attracted and for the smooth running of the room. Next door the Dealers Room appeared to be diverse, but I never had the time to do more than glance from the doorway. The main programming room was on the first floor next to the Dealers Room and hosted a number of events that needed the capacity offered, including convention awards (about which more later).

From the first-floor meeting rooms one could walk up a flight of slightly-hidden stairs to two secondary programming rooms and a third room devoted to fanzines, fan history displays, and cards. Alternately, one could walk past the hotel atrium to the elevators up to the Con Suite and Filk Room. Or, of course, one could walk between those two sets of rooms

around the perimeter of the second-floor atrium overlook.

Programming was diverse with a lot of science, fan history/fandom, and other panels in addition to the literary and movie-oriented ones. The filk track was reportedly very successful (and several big names were present) but as with the Dealers Room I didn't have time to sample it. I did make it to a few program items, including moderating a History of Huntsville Fandom panel way too early Saturday morning.

The aforementioned Con Suite was run rockingly by department head Regina Kirby with many assistants—including several NASFANs—and the rest of the social scene at DSC 50 was very active too. Both nights saw multiple parties—there were at least 6 on Saturday; on Friday I was helming the successful Con†Stellation XXXI room party and didn't get out to any but the con program listing had 12 total for the weekend. Breakfast both mornings was also a social event, as fans mixed and mingled at the tables with plates piled high with buffet food and/or made-to-order omelets. The hotel also had an evening reception that was more sparsely-attended than the breakfast as fans seemed to prefer finding each other in the atrium to go out to dinner or make party preparations.

One thing that DSC 50 lacked was organized gaming (with one exception I'll speak of shortly), but fans will find a way. The breakfast/evening reception area was one favorite destination for those seeking a fix

—the many 4-top tables could be rearranged into enough space to fit any game. DeepSouthCon does have one traditional gaming event that DSC 50 couldn't overlook.

The first two are for service to Southern Fandom by a fan and pro respectively and are official DSC awards. The last is not an official DSC award—it's administered by founder Gary Robe and is for a person or entity who has done much *to* Southern fandom.

The DSC committee surveyed previous Rebel and Phoenix winners; the final selection was reserved to Julie and Toni representing the committee. They kept Linda out of the loop for reasons that will shortly become evident. The **Phoenix Award** went to **John Ringo** <www.johningo.net>. There were two **Rebel Awards** given, to **Shelby Vick** <www.planetarystories.com> and to the **Zielke Clan** (Robert and Becky Zielke and Bill and Linda Zielke). The Rubble Award went to the current Official Editor of the Southern Fandom Press Alliance—Bob Jennings. Often the Rubble is given in good humor. Not so much this year as at least some SFPA members seem to have a bone to pick with Mr. Jennings.

DeepSouthCon 51—selected last year in Dallas—will be held 19–21 April 2013 in conjunction with JordanCon V <www.jordancon.org> at the Doubletree Hotel in Roswell GA (Atlanta area). The current membership rate is \$45 with discounts available for children under 12. Their announced guests are author Seanan McGuire and artist Michael Whelan. The hotel rate is \$95 plus taxes.

Site Selection for DSC 52 went to a committee headed by Gary Robe and Curt Phillips. Site negotiations are still pending, but the intent is for the con to be held in Bristol VA in May 2014.

I have one closing thought about an event at DSC 50. One NASFAn—Jack Lundy—was absent from the con because of a stroke suffered during a hip replacement. While Jack seems to be recovering, he was certainly missed. I'd like to offer special thanks to Wyman Cooke for all the effort he put into getting a large Get Well card signed by as many convention attendees as possible. Wyman reported that both Jack and his family got a great kick out of it.

Awards Roundup

MONSTER WINS FOR NESS, KAY

For the first time a single book—*A Monster Calls*—took both the Carnegie Medal (for the author) and the Kate Greenaway Medal (for the illustrator) <www.carnegiegreenaway.org.uk>.

The Carnegie Medal (for “the writer of an outstanding book for children” published in the UK) and the Kate Greenaway Medal (for “distinguished illustration in a book for children” likewise published) are sponsored by the Chartered Institute of Library and Information Professionals <www.cilip.org.uk> and are considered among the most prestigious awards for children’s literature. The awards were presented at a midday ceremony 14 June 2012 at The Barbican London.

Patrick Ness, author of *A Monster Calls*, also won the Carnegie Medal last year for *Monster of Men*. Jim Kay was honored for his illustrations which the press release called “haunting.”

CAMPBELL AND STURGEON AWARD WINNERS

The John W. Campbell Memorial Award (for best science fiction novel) and the Theodore Sturgeon Memorial Award (for best short sf) are given annually by J. Wayne and Elsie M. Gunn Center for the Study of Science Fiction <www.sfcenter.ku.edu/index.html> at the University of Kansas. While the winners were announced ahead of time, the awards were actually presented during the Campbell Conference Awards Banquet, held 5–8 July 2012 at the UK and nearby facilities in Lawrence KS. The ceremony itself was at The Oread hotel.

This year’s **Campbell** (for work in 2011) went to both **Christopher Priest**, for *The Islanders* and **Joan Slonczewski**, for *The Highest Frontier* due to a first-place tie. The **Sturgeon** went to **Paul McAuley** for “The Choice” (*Asimov’s* February 2011).

DITMAR & OTHER AUSSIE AWARDS ANNOUNCED

LOCUS AWARDS WINNERS

The winners of the 2012 Locus Awards have been announced at a ceremony held during the Science Fiction Awards Weekend, 15–17 June in Seattle WA. The awards are sponsored by the Locus Science Fiction Foundation. Winners are selected an online poll—originally of subscribers to *Locus Magazine* but now open to all (though reportedly subscribers votes count double).

Any further adventures of the Pie-Eyed Dragon? They are missed. Any adventure into Middle-Earth is bound to be a good one.

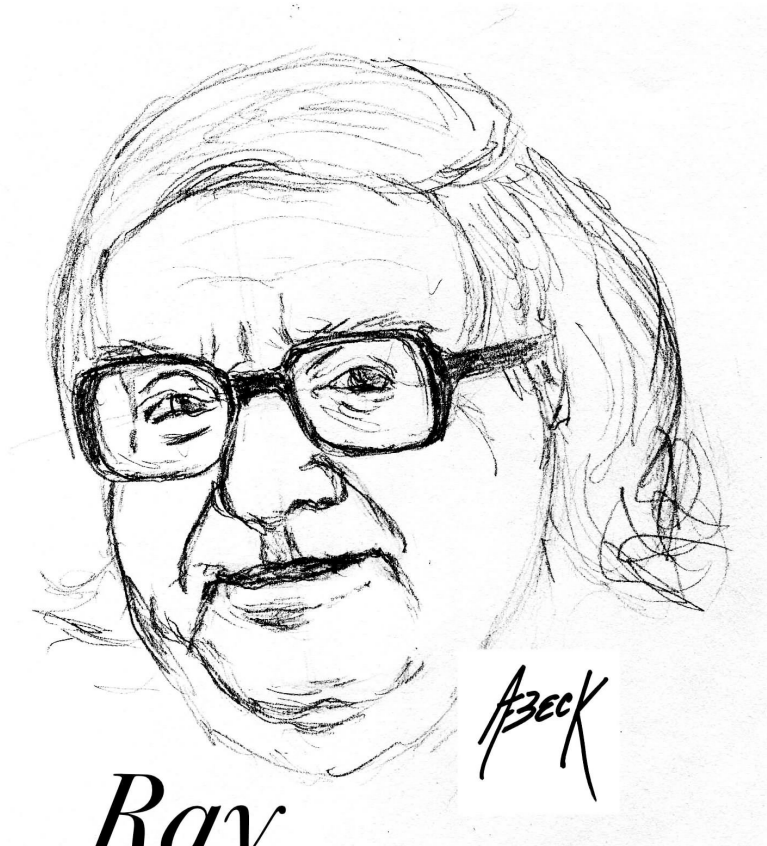
