



### OCTOBER ATMM

## CHANGING SHUTTLE DEADLINES ABBREVIATED ISSUE

The latest tweak to the *NASFA Shuttle* schedule shifted the usual repro date somewhat to the right (roughly the weekend before each meeting) but much of each issue will need to be put to bed as much as two weeks before the monthly meeting.

That was especially true this month where Con+Stellation fell on the above-mentioned usual-repro weekend. That pushed repro back to the left with much of the prep work as much as three weeks before the meeting. Because of the compressed schedule, this issue is somewhat abbreviated from what it would have been if a normal month's cycle had been available.

Please check the deadline below the Table of Contents *each month* to submit news, reviews, LoCs, or other material. We will generally need to enforce that deadline strictly.

### FUTURE PROGRAMS AND ATMMs

### SECOND 2014 NASFiC BID APPEARS

The existing Phoenix NASFiC bid <phoenixin2014.org> has been joined by a new Detroit bid <www.detroitin2014.org>. This will be the first contested NASFiC race in several years, assuming that both bids file the necessary paperwork to be listed on the ballot. (But then again this will only be the 4<sup>th</sup> NASFiC since the turn of the century and the 11<sup>th</sup> ever.)

To recap, the possibility of a NASFiC came into official existence when London won their 2014 Worldcon bid in August.

The vote to select the 2014 NASFiC site will be administered by the 2013 Worldcon <www.lonestarcon3.org>, in San Antonio.

### ANOTHER ONE BITES THE, UM, LIBRARY E-BOOK


According to *Publishers Weekly* <tinyurl.com/PWMcmLibEbk> Macmillan has announced a pilot program that may let them join the bulk of the "big six" publishers in allowing e-book lending by libraries. The details of the program have apparently not yet been made public.

If this pilot works and goes wide, it will leave only Simon & Schuster in the big six with no e-book lending program.

### RARE BOOK DEALER: "BRING OUT YOUR DEAD"

London rare book dealer Peter Harrington is selling <tinyurl.com/1stFrankie> Lord

Byron's copy of *Frankenstein*, inscribed to him by the author. The book was put on offer 26 September 2012 (and to be on display from then through 3 October). This slice of history can be yours if you're willing to meet the asking



price of no less than £350,000. The volume was rediscovered in 2011, after becoming "lost" when Byron's library was sold off after his death.

### WELCOME TO THEIR NIGHTMARE

A new online-only horror mag, *Nightmare* <www.nightmare-magazine.com>, was announced with a 1 October 2012 launch date. Editor John Joseph Adams and Creeping Hemlock Press describe the zine as being a monthly with a mix of new fiction (2 pieces), reprint fiction (2 pieces), an interview, art, and an editorial column. Issue 1 will cost \$2.99, a 12-issue subscription \$24.99. Launch funding came from a Kickstarter campaign.

Winners of the 2012 British Fantasy Awards <tinyurl.com/WFAConst> were announced at a ceremony Sunday 30 September 2012 at Fantasy Con <fantasycon2012.org>, at the Royal Albion Hotel in Brighton UK. Judges for most of the awards this year were James Barclay, Hal Duncan, Maura McHugh, Esther Sherman, and Damien G. Walter. Certain categories (the last five listed below) had separate juries. Thanks so much for the September *Shuttle*... I gather this is deadline day, and those deadlines are now strict ones, so I’d better get with it, with a quick loc.

The 2012 Worldcon had a few bumps along the way, I gather, but what little I heard about it was positive. I hope to read more reports as time goes by. Next up is LoneStarCon 3 in 2013 and Loncon 3 in 2014. We hope to be in London for that event.

(Ah, later on, there’s the report. Seems we never quite get it right, but we always try our best. Perhaps the Worldcon Bidder’s/Runner’s Bible needs some updating and more distribution. I tried to watch the Hugos via Ustream, but I had the same problem everyone else did, so I monitored via the text coverage, and that worked out just fine. The biggest complaint I heard was that even with the Hugo for Best Fancast, those darned podcasters went after more than the one silver rocket. Folks, you can’t stop them, and you want that rocket that badly, you may have to create content for the podcasts yourself.)

My letter of comment... speaking of Detroit, they have resurrected their old NASFiC bid. Long ago, they ran for the NASFiC in the 80s, and now they are offering a Detroit NASFiC for 2014. If I can’t get to London, maybe a quick zip down the highway to Detroit would do. I’ve never been to a NASFiC, and Detroit is a short drive down Highway 401. There is also a Montreal bid that’s changed its year a couple of times. I think they are now looking at 2016.

At SFContario 3, where Chris Garcia is the FanGoH, Jo Walton is the ProGoH, and we’ll be able to congratulate her in person for her novel *Among Others* winning both the Hugo and Nebula this year. Few other authors and novels have been able to do that.

I have done about all I can for right now... hope all of you have a great autumn, and I am going to go and lie down for a few hours. It’s been a long week.

[This month is *crazy* with fannish activities for me; chairing a con, even a smallish one like Con†Stellation, adds an astounding amount of work the last many weeks. So, yea, having your letter this early is a *good* thing. After I wrote my Chicon 7 report last month I felt it sounded too negative—especially given I was using second-hand info. I did try to soften that in the last three paragraphs but I’m not sure I succeeded. I’ve read some real vitriol online about some aspects of the con but many of those screeds read as if they are saying “you failed my litmus test in one area, therefore you failed completely in every area.” One finds it hard to give much credit to that kind of complaint. Meanwhile, yep, there are lots of positive—even glowing—reviews of Chicago’s con. In other news, I heard about the Detroit NASFiC bid just a couple of days before your LoC. With Phoenix long established I was a little surprised at another bid, but contested races can make for stronger conventions, so no worries here. The Montreal Worldcon bid <worldcon.org/bids>

is for 2017 as I understand it. That's an interesting year as Japan has already announced a bid and there's still the possibility that New York will bid (though apparently that's less probable than it once was). It's also been pointed out that 2017 is

the 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the 1967 International Expo in Montreal as well as Canada's 150<sup>th</sup> birthday and the 375<sup>th</sup> birthday of Montreal. One suspects there could be a few celebrations in Montreal that year independent of Worldcon. -ED]



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
