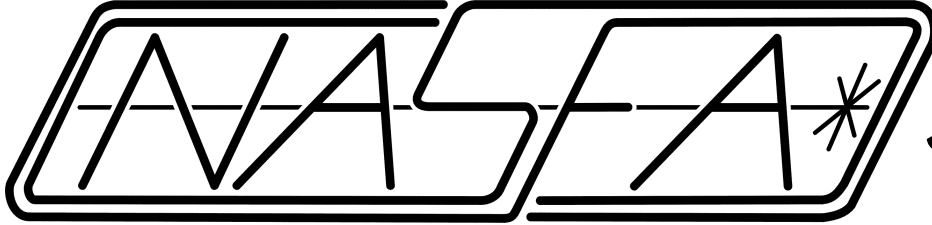

CONCOM MEETINGS

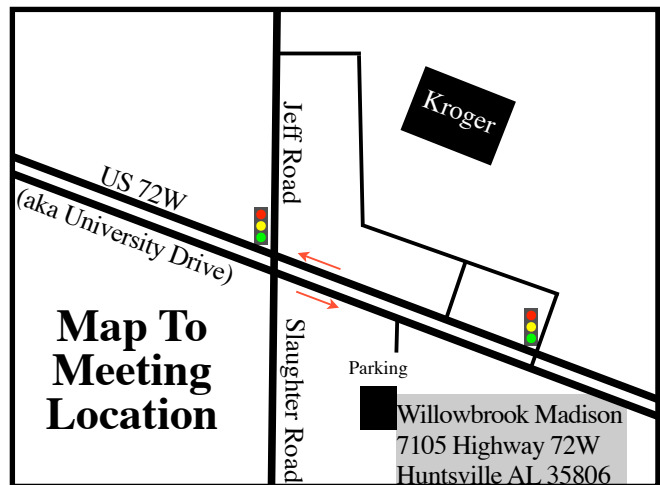

LONESTARCON 3 FILM FESTIVAL

Worldcon 71—LoneStarCon 3, to be held 29 August–2 September 2013 in San Antonio TX—has announced the lineup for their LSC 3 Independent Film Festival <www.lonestarcon3.org/film>. The lineup is said to include sf/f/h/comics short features and trailers “from the US, Canada, Israel, Australia, New Zealand, and many countries of Europe.” Info available on the website includes a screening schedule.

LONESTARCON 3 BUSINESS MEETING

Speaking of Worldcon, a number of items of new business are being mooted for the Business Meeting. An up-to-date list of officially submitted items can be found at <www.lonestarcon3.org/wfs/wfs-bm-2013.shtml>. Three of the items that promise to be controversial are proposed constitutional amendments:

- One to eliminate three fan Hugo categories,
- A second to put a floor, of sorts, on the cost of any membership class that includes Hugo and Site Selection voting

rights, and

- A third to eliminate the requirement that electronic publications be “opt-in” only.

That last was still being discussed at press time and had not been posted to the LSC 3 website.

TO THE MOON, ~~ALICE~~ HUNTSVILLE

Moon Express <www.moonexpress.com> has opened a Propulsion Development Facility in Huntsville. Moon Express plans to “send a series of robotic spacecraft to the Moon for ongoing exploration and commercial development.” The systems in question are said to be in the 0.1–1000 pound thrust range. Presumably these would be maneuvering and possibly lunar landing/takeoff thrusters.

IS IT EASY BEING GREEN, HUNTSVILLE?

Huntsville lands on a lot of Top 10 lists, though this one was a bit of a surprise to Your Editor. TravelNerd.com placed Our Fair City on their Top 10 List of destinations for green travelers. They cited the Huntsville Botanical Garden and Harmony Park Safari as destinations, and the city's Operation Green Team <www.hsvcity.com/greenteam> in the “green initiatives” category.

TUCKER STORIES WANTED

Former Huntsvillain and current Baen Books publisher Toni Weisskopf *wants you*—wants you to send her stories about Wilson “Bob” Tucker.

Toni notes that she started gathering material in the 1980s but didn't feel up to writing a formal biography at that time. LE GUIN FEMINIST SF FELLOWSHIP

The Center for the Study of Women in Society <csws.uoregon.edu>, the University of Oregon Knight Library <library.uoregon.edu/knight/index.html>, and the Robert D. Clark Honors College <honors.uoregon.edu> have established the Le Guin Feminist Science Fiction Fellowship “to encourage research within collections in the area of feminist science fiction.”

The first fellowship (to be announced early November 2013) will be for \$3000. Information on applying for the grant can be found at <csws.uoregon.edu/?p=16615>.

OMNI ~~REDOX~~ REBOOT

Science/sf magazine *OMNI* (1978–1998, in various forms) is being revived as online magazine OMNI Reboot <omnireboot.com>. Editor Claire Evans says she's taking a cue from long-time *OMNI* editor Ben Bova and wants to shape OMNI Reboot as “a magazine about the future.” Art, and possibly other material, from the original magazine is expected to see reuse on the webzine.

MUNSEY AWARD

The winner of the 2013 Munsey Award (for service to the pulp community) was announced 27 July 2013 at Pulpfest 2013 <www.pulpfest.com>. The winner is **Garyn G. Roberts**.

EMMY NOMS ANNOUNCED

The nominations for the 65th Annual Primetime Emmy Awards have been announced. The winners will be announced in a televised ceremony 22 September 2013.

Putting aside the technical categories (editing, cinematography, costuming, and the like) and the animated categories (where it can be hard to tell genre from non-genre) the leader in sf/f/h noms is *Game of Thrones*, with nods for Drama Series; Supporting Actor, Drama (Peter Dinklage); Supporting Actress, Drama (Emilia Clarke); Guest Actress, Drama (Diana Rigg); and Interactive Program.

American Horror Story: Asylum isn't too far behind with honors in Miniseries or Movie; Actress, Miniseries or Movie (Jessica Lange); and Supporting Actor, Miniseries or Movie (James Cromwell).

Two other genre shows got one nomination each—*Bates Motel* (Actress, Drama, Vera Farmiga) and *The Walking Dead* (Interactive Program).

Quite a few shows of geek interest (albeit non-genre) also got noticed. *The Big Bang Theory* got the nod for Comedy Series; Actor, Comedy (Jim Parsons); Supporting Actress, Comedy (Mayim Bialik); and Guest Actor, Comedy (Bob Newhart). An Actor, Miniseries or Movie nom went to Benedict Cumberbatch for *Sherlock: A Scandal in Belgravia*. A Reality Program nom went to *MythBusters*. A Documentary or Nonfiction Series nom went to *Through the Wormhole with Morgan Freeman*.

PARSEC AWARD NOMS

The finalists for the 2013 Parsec Awards <www.parsecawards.com> (for speculative fiction podcasting) have been announced. The award process is a bit complex, involving a fan nomination round and two separate rounds of judges. Winners will be announced at this year's Dragon*Con <www.dragoncon.org>, to be held 30 August-2 September 2013 in Atlanta GA.

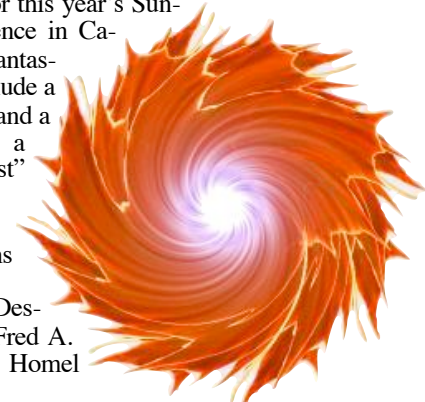

Waiting Is Ended

No Need for a Questing Beast—Prologue, 2006

[Editor's Note: PieEyedDragon's adventures in Middle-Earth will resume in these pages later. In the meantime, we take you to another time and location. PED spends less time "on camera" in this adventure, but still plays a part.]

I was "resting" in Iceland; attuned to my ball-of-twine global sensor net. There was always a lot of noise, but "location, location, location" is important.

It's largely a tropical rain forest with many birds and crabs, surmounted by the mountain peak. To the unfortunate short Jotuns who get assigned there as watchers, it's hell. The last one who got a bad batch of Total Eclipse™ Sun Block SPF 277 got petrified while mountain climbing. I spent two years on that island around 960 AD, and found nothing to worry about.

There are many birds flying all over. One larger one seemed interested in a small boat. As I watched, I saw that it was *much* larger than the boat, and snatching up people in its claws... Not a bird... A *Gyaos*!

For six thousand years, I had been watching for the *Gyaos* monsters of Mu while Mother mostly slept. She had kept watch for millennia since the destruction of Atlantis, but the *Gyaos* delayed their return. dipped below the northern horizon at all, I broke out of my shell.

Now, the monsters have decided to make an appearance. In recent years, with help, many dormant nests had already been eliminated. It looks like at least one was missed. I keyed my telepathic channel to Gamera and sent the warning. I see many other young monsters, trying their wings and gradually moving away from the island.

I make myself very small and enter the throat of the nearest. Inside, I give the beast a fatal heartburn. Some of the others drift over, looking suspicious. Some, though, look to be moving away. I *cannot* let them scatter. I have to give them a reason to stay. I have to give them... a visible *enemy* to concentrate upon.

I dive down into the water, expand to full size, and burst upward, bellowing my challenge.

This works. *All* the surviving monsters are heading straight for me. Some of them pull up a bit and open their jaws wide. I am able to avoid the immature sonic cutting beams... for a while. My own breath weapons, fortunately, have a wider field of effect. I am much too busy to call up any major offensive spells. Holographic doppelgängers, mists, and light-bending gas bubbles distract and mislead the monsters for a time. But, there are just too many. Five suicidally brave Merfolk and Kelpies plunge into the fray, distracting a few of the monsters. Their brave efforts helped me. Then they were swatted.

July 20 at 1704 GMT, Gamera blasted up out of Vatnajökull at full burn. She crossed the North Pole and headed south over the Pacific. It was a long, long way to Indonesia.

When Gamera finally arrived, I was down on the beach; along with nineteen of the monsters. The remaining four gave plenty of damage to Gamera before they, too, died. Even immature, their sonic beams can cut through anything.

The Jotun wizard corps finally arrived to do some memory erasures, sanitize the area and pick up the pieces—literally, in my case. Three legs were off and my tail was half-severed along with numerous smaller slices. They got me stabilized and loaded onto Gamera's back for transport back to Iceland.

Surgery was a problem. I have a lot of magic resistance, so they had to stitch. Making holes for sutures was difficult until Gamera started poking them with her claws. I was awake, and formally transferred the Jotun scepter to the Crown Princess despite Atali's advanced pregnancy.
