CONCOM MEETINGS


The schedule for future Con†Stellation XXXIII concom

2016 WORLDCON BIDS OFFICIAL

The two expected Worldcon bids for 2016 filed their paperwork before the deadline. Both Beijing <www.guokr.com/ zone/worldcon> and Kansas City http://kcin2016.org> will appear on the ballot for the site selection administered by this year's Worldcon in London.

The filed paperwork can be seen at <www.loncon3.org/ 2016_bidder_filing.php>. The ballot itself was not available as this article was being prepared. Site selection ballots can be mailed, hand delivered, or cast on site at Loncon 3. Due to constitutional restrictions electronic balloting is difficult to arrange for site selection and the Shuttle's understanding is that it will not be used this year.

FÁAn AWARDS VOTING OPEN

Voting has begun for the 2014 Fan Activity Achievement Awards; the closing date is 5 April 2014. A PDF ballot is available online at <file770.com/wp-content/uploads/faan_ballot_ 2014.pdf>. Winners will be announced at Corflu 31 <www. corflu.org> to be held 2-4 May 2014 at the DoubleTree Hotel & Conference Center in Richmond VA.

Awards are presented in eight categories: Genzine, Personal Fanzine, Single Issue, Website, Fanzine Cover, Fan Artist, Fan Writer ,and the Harry Warner, Jr. Memorial Award for Best Letterhack. You can rank three choices, which receive 3, 2, and 1 points respectively.

February Minutes by Steve Sloan

The February meeting of the North Alabama Science Fiction Association was called to order on Saturday, February 8, 2014, in the Madison satellite location of Willowbrook Baptist Church at 6:19:07P by President Mary Lampert. The gavel and crickets were both in attendance.

OLD BUSINESS

In January, we had tabled a discussion about electing the con chair (Con†Stellation convention chair) for a two year term. In February, we had Shelley, one of the two elected 2015 co-con chairs, at the meeting for discussion.

Craig retracted his proposal of acting as con chair for two years starting in 2014. He instead volunteered to serve for three years following Shelley and Jenny's 2015 con chair term.

Doug moved that we railroad Craig into serving as con chair for 2015, 2016, and 2017. Craig seconded.

Craig expanded on his stability argument for having two year terms, stating that stability extends from con chair on down. Judy argued that if the club is uncomfortable with something Craig does, then we would be stuck if we nominated him for multiple years. Tracey said that we'd like to see what he does the first year before choosing him for other years. Craig asked what would happen if he couldn't get a guest one year but could get that guest the next year. Sue asked if we could get hotel dates that far in advance. Craig suggested that we might if we signed a multi-year contract. Having dates and a hotel would have stability in itself. Shelley said she would be fine with a previous con chair setting up a multi-year hotel contract.

Sam moved that we table the motion until after this year's con. Sam's motion was seconded and carried many to three.

NEW BUSINESS

None.

CON BUSINESS

Craig hoped to go to hotels to talk about hosting Con†Stellation during the week following this meeting. He had planned to ask about hotels the previous week, but didn't manage it because OSHA decided to visit his work.

Craig gave a brief summary of the previous con-com (Con†Stellation convention committee meeting). He is looking for volunteers to fill convention offices. He already has Steve as guest liaison, Mary as hotel liaison, Randy to run Art Show, and Mike K. as web master. Craig will be looking for more volunteers for one more month, then he will start asking peo-

Craig has narrowed his hotel choices to two: Holiday Inn at Madison Square Mall in Huntsville and Country Hearth Inn and Suites in Madison. The Holiday Inn is doable but it is a bit cramped with awkward logistics.

The people who ran the Artemis virtual starship bridge game last year will be back in 2014, hopefully with two starships.

Craig has ideas for "odd things" to do at the con: He plans to hold a Spirited Art class Friday night to allow guests to learn to paint, then on Saturday we can match the guest with the painting. Craig plans to make the Chairman's Reception and the Guest of Honor speeches into a single event on Saturday afternoon, held roughly 4-6P, followed by the Art Auction. He's not planning to have a Masquerade this year, but he will continue the hall costume contest. He plans to bring back the dance on Saturday night, after providing ballroom dance lessons held by the West Coast Swing group.

Dues are due. Treasurer Sam read a list of the members who had paid their dues so far.

Craig moved to adjourn at 6:46:42P.

The February program was Mike K.'s "Short Attention Span Theater." Maria and Adam Grim hosted the After-the-Meeting Meeting at the meeting location at Willowbrook Madison.

LONCON 3 HUGO MC KERFUFFLE

Okay, this one is complicated and, either personally or in my capacity as *Shuttle* editor, I don't pretend to know all the facts. Not even close.

Loncon 3, this year's Worldcon, selected an MC for the Hugo Awards. There was distention within the committee about the person chosen. One division head resigned. Social media blew up over the selection. The MC withdrew. The public part of this took about a day or less—though the preceding internal committee stuff was a good bit longer—happening basically overnight for US fans. That much seems certain.

The (now ex-) MC in question is UK media personality Jonathan Ross; who does have a history of controversy—readers are left to their own devices to research that. Whether Mr. Ross is sexist (or any of several other -ists he's been accused of) is probably not the point. Inviting a controversial figure was likely a poor choice no matter now justified (or un-) that controversy may be. Accusations of sexism and a dozen other -isms have been blowing up with great regularity in and around sf fandom (and prodom) recently. A safe, middle of the road—even boring—choice for MC would probably have been a more prudent choice this year than one who invites more controversy.

One hopes that future Worldcon committees (and bidders) will be paying attention and will think about any implications for them.
