The intent going forward is for the concom to meet on club


meeting days, at least until we get close enough to the con to require going to two meetings a month. Stay tuned, though, and consider all meeting dates past this month as tentative until confirmed.

TIPTREE FELLOWSHIPS CREATED

Administrators of the James Tiptree, Jr. Award <tiptree.org> have established the Tiptree Fellowships, to be awarded annually beginning this year. The two \$500 fellowships will be for "creators who are doing work that pushes forward the Tiptree mission." The announcement mentions "writers, artists, scholars, media makers, remix artists, performers, musicians, or something else entirely" who are "doing work that is changing the way we think about gender through speculative narrative" as possible recipients.

Applications are expected to open at this year's WisCon <www.wiscon.info>, to be held 21–24 May 2015 at the Madison Concourse Hotel & Governor's Club in Madison WI.

GUFF CALLS FOR CANDIDATES

The Going Under/Get Up and Over Fan Fund <www.taff. org.uk/guff.html> is taking nominations for a European fan to travel to Australasia in 2016. They will be expected to attend (at least) Contact2016 < contact2016.com>, the 55th Australian National Science Fiction Convention, to be held 25-28 March 2016 in Brisbane, Australia.

Depending on the length of trip the winner can make, they are also encouraged to visit other parts of Australia as well as New Zealand. With the NZ natcon in early June that year, it would require a somewhat long trip to make it to that as well.

Hugo & Site Selection Open

Voting for the Hugo and Campbell Awards has opened, as has Site Selection for the 2017 Worldcon. More details about each follows, though most members of Sasquan have already received ballots for both via postal mail.

HUGO/CAMPBELL VOTING: MORE COMPLICATED THAN USUAL

Since the initial announcements of finalists for the Hugo Awards and Campbell Award, the tale has gotten more complex. (See the April 2015 issue of the *Shuttle* for basic info on the Sad Puppies and Rabid Puppies effect on Hugo noms.)

A couple of (now ex-) finalists have been found to be ineligible *and* four people have withdrawn nominations—some but not all in time to have their slot re-filled by a work that didn't make the initial list. It should be noted that nominees are always contacted—subject to available contact info—before the finalists are announced to ask if they wish to accept the nomination. A lack of response within some stated time limit is taken as a positive reply. These changes (including the ineligibility declarations) all happened *after* that time... two of them so late that the ballot had already been sent to the printer.

Rather than try to list all the withdrawals (and, where applicable, replacements) I'll just refer you to the Sasquan website. The as-printed ballot can be found at <sasquan.org/wp-content/

uploads/2015/05/2015-Hugo-Award-Ballot.pdf>. However, the large majority of Hugo voters in recent years have voted electronically—for which see <sasquan.org/hugo-awards/voting>. It is not clear if the electronic form will note withdrawn nominees that appear on the printed ballot. You need to know your membership number and have a PIN issued by this year's Worldcon to vote electronically. That has already been emailed to Sasquan members, but there's an email address (at both links above) that you can use to request a reminder.

The deadline for Hugo & Campbell voting is Friday 31 July 2015, 11:59P PDT. Note that you can enter your electronic Hugo/Campbell votes in stages; making additions and changes right up to the deadline. *Only the final version* of your vote will be counted, no matter how many times you make changes.

SITE SELECTION VOTING

Unlike voting for the Hugos & Campbell, Worldcon Site Selection voting cannot be done (fully) electronically—the theory being that printed ballots allow the bidding committees to audit the voting. Sasquan is trying to allow "partial" electronic voting but even an emailed PDF ballot must be *hand*-signed. You can find details online at <sasquan.org/site-selection>.

Mailed in ballots must *reach* Sasquan by Monday 10 August 2015, 24:00 PDT. Site Selection voting can also be done at the convention, either in person or via a ballot hand-carried by a friend.

All ballots must be accompanied by a \$40 fee (there is a way to do this electronically) which buys the voter a Supporting Membership for the winning bid. Filed bidders are Washington DC, Shizuoka City Japan, Montreal, and Helsinki. Write-ins are possible, but to be eligible a site must file certain paperwork with the administering convention. The listed bids have said paperwork already on file and linked from the site selection website above.
