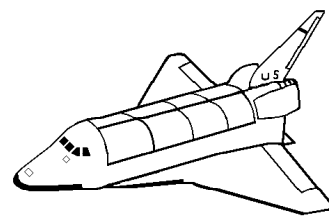

Con†Stellation XVII

A SHORT, BIASED REVIEW

Con†Stellation XVII: Hydra took place 9–11 October 1998 at the Four Points Hotel in Huntsville AL. Guests included GoH Mike Resnick, MC Tim Powers, AGoH Bob Eggleton, and FGoH David O. Miller. Other notables attending included Toni Weisskopf, Rick Shelley, and Stepan Chapman.

It is said that a science fiction convention is different for every person attending. If so, then a bit over 250 conventions went on in Huntsville that weekend. And I think the vast majority of them were enjoyable.

Programming events seemed to be fairly well attended this year, no doubt due at least in part to the eclectic mix of items available. Scheduling attempted to be fan friendly. For instance, art buffs could attend a back-to-back-to-back triple serving Saturday morning and early afternoon. Major events, like the GoH speeches, the art auction, and the masquerade, were (as usual) Saturday evening and were scheduled with just enough slack between them to assure that they could start on time.

In terms of overt audience response, there were two major highlights in the programming. The first was the multi-part Fannish Family Feud contest. The game was modeled after the Richard Dawson TV game show *Family Feud*, and featured Baen editor Toni Weisskopf as the MC. The first round took place Friday evening with one of the teams being fans from the LibertyCon committee and the other being Resnick, Powers, Eggleton, and Miller. The pros acquitted themselves admirably, despite the handicap that most of them had never seen the TV game, but the LibertyCon team managed to pull off the victory on the final question. The second round (on Saturday afternoon) had two fan teams, one drawn, more or less, from the Southern Fandom Confederation, and one pick up group. The SFC team (consisting of the present and just past presidents and their respective spouses) won with a big score, though the game was much closer than the score indicated. The playoff round, between the LibertyCon and SFC teams, took place during the judging interval at the masquerade. LibertyCon pulled off the victory in another game with a lopsided score that didn't indicate how close the race really was. Toni and all the contestants were great and the off-the-wall answers evoked a lot of audience amusement.

But if the FFF game had the best sustained audience response, the Masquerade provided the greatest peak response. There were about a dozen entries, several of which got well-deserved approval from the attendees. Far and away the big-

gest response was reserved for what proved to be the Best In Show entry, the entire Miller (as in David O. Miller) clan appearing as characters from the TV show *Xena: Warrior Princess*, with David in the title role. You had to be there for the full effect, but you can get a taste if you'll check out the convention web site sometime later this month when some of the pictures will be published. The exact address is to be determined but look for links starting at <<http://www.hsv.tis.net/~constell/constell>>.

And speaking of Best In Show, the Art Show had a number of pieces that could compete for that title. See the sidebar for all the winners. Art Show head Randy Cleary walked away the proud owner of Eggleton's Best In Show "Golden Ship." I didn't even *ask* how much he paid but he seemed to be happy with the bargain. In fact art sales were rather brisk with over \$3100 in sales.

Reportedly Dealers Room sales were pretty good, too, though I don't have any clue as to the dollar amount. Several dealers (including a new book dealer and a used book dealer) were happy enough to plunk down cash on the spot to assure they have space in the room next year.

Overall the crowd at this year's Con†Stellation seemed to be a bit older than in previous years. This was reflected all the way from the really young ages (a lot of the Children's Programming track was sadly underused) through the twenty-somethings (Live Action Role Playing, though well enjoyed, had only 20 participants). The greying of fandom is a well-

known phenomenon but a number of younger fans who have graced Con†Stellation in the past just didn't show this year.

That may or may not have been due to the one somewhat serious glitch that came up just pre-con. It seems that local college football power Alabama A&M has moved to a much larger conference effective this year. It happened that Con†Stellation's weekend coincided with their homecoming — an event in the past that would have a noticeable but not huge effect on hotel room sales in Huntsville. This year the buzz was that attendance was expected to triple at homecoming, most of the increase coming from out of town. This fact didn't become known to Con†Stellation *or* the hotel until about two weeks before the con. Every hotel in the Huntsville metro area was booked solid for that weekend, including the Four Points. As it turned out, a significant number of the football people canceled at the last minute so there were hotel rooms available

at the Four Points for both Friday and Saturday nights. But of course people (especially out-of-towners) might have been reluctant to come to the con when the possibility existed that they wouldn't be able to find a room anywhere nearby. To avoid this problem, next year's Con†Stellation has already been scheduled to be on a weekend that A&M is not having a home game.

There's lots more to say about Con†Stellation, from the always-successful Con Suite to the often crowded Game Room to the overall smooth operations. (At least it seemed to look smooth to the attendees, the duck is always frantically paddling *under* the water.) But my biases have shown enough so I guess I'll sign off — except to deliver a teaser for next year. Tentative information for Con†Stellation XVIII: Lupus is that it will be held 29–31 October 1999 with GoH Allen Steele, MC David Weber, and FGoHs Tom and Anita Feller.
