All the information and statistics on the recent worldcon in the September Shuttle are very welcome. I don't suppose the comparatively small attendance at the event is a significant clue to future worldcon turnouts, since Australia is so far from North American and even European fandom and air fare is so expensive. But an attendee should have had at least a fighting chance of finding the people he wanted to see in Melbourne, a procedure that is much more difficult when there are six or seven thousand persons at a convention.

I found the data on Hugo voting below the nominations as interesting as the returns on those who were actually on the ballot. It's a shame Sheryl missed a nomination by only two votes after one of the nominees for fan artist was obviously the beneficiary of bloc voting. And I feel rather out of it when I flash everyone, assuming her equipment works.

Also look out for our, um, pets scattered around the con. At the very least you'll find a miniature howling wolf, an oversized rubber rat, and a full-sized lounge-wolf in the con suite. (Of course, we're not responsible if you run into live wolves of the two-legged variety.)

realize I've never heard of two of the first fifteen for fan writers.

I'm not sure I understand the change in site selection. If it means what I think it does, that 500-mile exclusion provision will make it very difficult for some Eastern cities to win a site contest in certain years, and this might prove to be a handicap if the number of cities with hotels large enough to host a worldcon and willing to accept one continues to dwindle.

The news about Mike Ray is very saddening and I hope Doc Brookshire pulls through his own injuries. You don't give Mike's age but I gather that he was comparatively young or not more than middle-aged, at least, and that continues the awful trend of fans who die before they've reached something approximating today's life expectancy.

Sheryl might be able to use new ribbons in her typewriters if the problem is finding spools that will fit the mechanism rather than the width of the ribbons required. If spools were in the typewriters when she acquired them and they are meant for ribbons of the width that was more or less standard for nonelectric typewriters in the first half of the century, it's possible to rewind a new ribbon intended for some other type of typewriter onto the old spools. I may need to do this when the evil day comes that renders this ribbon too faint to be readable, although I still haven't visited a shop in nearby Pennsylvania that carries several varieties of ribbons for non-electric machines. It's supposed to be a tedious task that leaves the hands smeared darkly for several days.

[No, I wouldn't read anything into the Aussiecon attendance either, Harry. Since you ask, Mike Ray was in his mid-30's. His death was tragic and his relative youth, of course, makes it even more so. On another topic, I'm surprized that only one person (so far) has complained to me about the tiny type in the two statistical listings last issue. When I had a lot less to print than my typical Worldcon issue, I became *determined* to keep the issue to 5 sheets so it could go on one stamp. There are a few more Worldcon-related items in this issue that (had they been in the previous issue) would have forced me to go over the one ounce postage rate. I haven't spent a lot of time analyzing the voting, but there are always a few surprises — if you look closely. Like how well "last-place" nominations did in the longer fiction categories (second place in novels, winning in novellas). Or how nominees can do quite well against the eventual first place winners but still wind only fourth or fifth place (see, for instance, Dramatic Presentation and Professional Artist). -ED]
