#### THE RACE GOES TO THE SWFFest

The latest issue of the *Southern Fandom Confederation Update* brings news of the newly-established South-Western Fan Fund. The idea is to swap representatives of Southern Fandom (specifically, someone from the region eligible for DeepSouth-Con) and of Western Fandom (specifically, someone from the region eligible for Westercon) on a biannual basis.

The initial, 2011, race will send a Southern fan to Westercon. Next year the intent would be for a Western fan to come to DSC. To start, SWFF will be administered by Warren Buff (Southern Region) <warrenmbuff@gmail.com> and Chris Garcia (Western Region) <garcia@computerhistory.org>. The Southern Fan Confederation will act as the initial depository, and a report on the finances of the fund will be given at the SFC business meeting during DSC. Once a delegate has been selected and made their trip, they will assume administration duties for their region.

Candidates must declare by 1 March 2011. Voting will then go through 1 May 2011. For details of nominating and voting please contact either of the administrators (see email addresses above).

#### TAFF CANDIDATES SPEAK UP

Meanwhile, one of those candidates, Graham Charnock, has added a wrinkle to this year's campaign by making available a set of laminated badges and a campaign poster <www.cartiledgeworld.co.uk/collect.html> as a fundraiser for TAFF. (Well, and to raise his own profile in the selection process, too.)

#### SPEAKING OF TAFF, THE DEADLINE HAS MOVED

After receiving assurances that the fan program for this year's Worldcon could accommodate fitting in the winner with less lead time, the TAFF administrators have extended the voting deadline through Tuesday 26 April 2011. Among other things, this allows onsite voting to take place at this year's Eastercon (UK natcon).

#### **DUFF NOMS OPEN**

Nominations for the 2001 Down Under Fan Fund have opened. This year's race is for the South-to-North direction to enable an Australasian fan to travel to the US for the Reno Worldcon. #### WORLDCON MEMBERSHIP RATES INCREASE

As of 1 March 2011, several classes of membership in Renovation <www.renovationsf.org>, the 69<sup>th</sup> World Science Fiction Convention, will cost more. Adult Attending memberships will bump up \$15 to \$195. Conversions from Supporting to Attending will go to \$145 while conversions from Friend of the Bid Supporting will become \$105. The Family Rate (2 adults plus 2 or more dependent children) will increase to \$480.

Rates for several classes will remain unchanged: Children (0–16) Attending will stay \$75, Young Adult (17–21) will still be \$100, and Supporting memberships will continue at \$50. Child and Young Adult rates are based on the person's age as of 17 August 2011.

#### RENOVATION FILM FESTIVAL SHAPING UP

Speaking of the Reno Worldcon, Renovation has announced a list of over 25 (mostly short) films <www.renovationsf.org/filmfest-entries.php> to be shown in a film festival as part of the con. The list is apparently expected to grow.

#### BANKRUPTCIES AND RUMORS OF BANKRUPTCIES

A major Canadian book distributor, H.B. Fenn and Company Ltd. <www.hbfenn.com>, has filed for bankruptcy. HBF was the Canadian distributor for several genre lines, including Tor and Hyperion.

Meanwhile, the Wall Street Journal has said that bookseller Borders Group Inc. <www.borders.com> "is in the final stages of preparing a bankruptcy filing." The Chapter 11 filing is believed to be imminent enough that it may have occurred before these words reach your eyeballs. At present, Borders is the third largest bookseller in the United States. In related news, academic publisher John Wiley & Sons announced in a February Securities and Exchange Commission filing that it will write off \$9 million in debt—owed by Borders—as uncollectable.

Also, Huntsville, as local readers of the *Shuttle* know, recently suffered the closing of genre book and gaming store BookMark. All in all it's been a tough time for fans of books in general—and written sf/f/h in particular—around here.

The Speculative Literature Foundation < www. speculativeliterature.org> is accepting applications for their 2011 Older Writers Grant. The \$750 grant is for a writer of speculative literature 50 years or older who is just beginning to work professionally in the field. Applications are available on their website and must be received by 31 March 2011. The winner will be announced 1 June.

#### ALA HONORS GENRE FIGURES

The American Library Association <www.ala.org> has honored two major genre authors. Paolo Bacigalupi won the Mi**chael L. Printz Award** for his YA novel *Ship Breaker*. By some reckonings, the Printz is the third most prestigious award given by the ALA, trailing only the Newberry and Caldecott Medals. Meanwhile Sir Terry Pratchett won the Margaret A. Edwards Lifetime Achievement Award from the ALA's Young Adult Library Services Association—also not too shabby!

#### AURORAS TO GIVE CASH

Canada's Prix Aurora Awards <www.prixaurorawards.ca> has received sponsorship from SF Canada <www.sfcanada. com>, Canada's association of professional speculative fiction writers, to add \$500CAD prizes to the English- and Frenchlanguage novel categories. Well, technically, the cash awards will be separate from the Prix Auroras (and will be known as the SF Canada Award). The Auroras are selected by popular vote of Canadian spec fic fans. Nominations for the 2011 awards are open through April.

#### KETCHUM NAMED GRAND MASTER

Horror writer Jack Ketchum (Dallas Mayr) has been selected as a horror Grand Master by the members of the 2011 World Horror Convention <www.whc2011.org>, to be held 28 April-1 May 2011 in Austin TX.

#### CRAWFORD AWARD ANNOUNCED

Karen Lord has been named the winner of the 2011 William L. Crawford Award (for first fantasy book)-for Redemption in Indigo (Small Beer Press). The juried award is presented annually at The International Conference on the Fantastic in the Arts <www.iafa.org>, to be held this year 16–20 March in Orlando FL.

#### POTTER, LEE GET BAFTAS

The Harry Potter series of films has been given a British Academy of Film and Television Arts Award for **Outstanding** British Contribution to Cinema in 2011. Author J.K. Rowling and Producer David Heyman were given the award on behalf of the franchise during a ceremony at London's Royal Opera House on Sunday 13 February 2011.

At the same ceremony Sir Christopher Lee received a lifetime achievement award BAFTA. Though best known as a horror star, Lee's sf/f credits include Saruman in the Lord of the Rings trilogy and Count Dooku in the Star Wars preguels. A full list of his credits would fill the Shuttle.


