

News & Info

TAFF SLATE SET, VOTE OPEN

The full slate for the Trans-Atlantic Fan Fund <taff.org.uk> has been set. Two individuals and one couple are seeking to win in this west-to-east year. The would represent North American fandom while attending Loncon 3 <loncon3.org>, the 2014 Worldcon to be held 14–18 August 2014 at ExCeL, London Docklands.

The nominees—Brad and Cindy Foster, Curt Phillips, and Randy Smith—have published their platforms. Several ways of voting, including via PayPal, are available at the TAFF website. A minimum contribution to the fund (\$3/£2) is required to vote.

2014 WORLDCON UPDATES

If you want to join the TAFF winner at Loncon 3, be advised that membership rates will increase at the end of February so you may not want to delay.

Meanwhile, nominations are open for the Hugo Awards (as well as the Campbell Award and the 1939 Retro Hugo Awards). Members of last year's Worldcon (LoneStarCon 3, San Antonio TX), Loncon 3, and next year's Worldcon (Sasquan, Spokane WA) are all eligible to nominate. Nominations can be made by mail or online (see <loncon3.org/nominations.php> for links to either). You will need a PIN to nominate online; instructions for getting yours are at that same URL.

Hotel reservations are also open, and if you don't have yours already you may not be able to get your first choice. Or your second choice. Or your third... UK hotels, even those close to large convention centers, are generally much smaller than those in the US and Loncon 3 is no exception to that tendency. Rooms are especially scarce on the shoulder nights. The *Shuttle* recommends you get to the third-party booking site <www. infotel.co.uk/RateCards/Hotels.aspx?rc=RC_LONCON3> at your earliest possible convenience. FWIW, the glitches seem to be due to a degree of unexpected success—Loncon 3 looks to be one of the largest Worldcons in recent decades. Too, London is, well, London.

2014 NASFIC UPDATES

Detcon1 <www.detcon1.org>, the 2014 North American Science Fiction Convention—to be held 17–20 July 2014 at the Renaissance Center Marriott in Detroit MI—has also opened hotel reservations. Things seem to be going much smoother for them. Too, Detroit is, well, Detroit.

Separately, Detcon1 has announced they are sponsoring a pair of member's choice awards, named the Detcon1 Awards for Young Adult and Middle Grade Speculative Fiction. These are intended to complement the juried Golden Duck Awards <www.goldenduck.org> (given annually for children's and YA science fiction), which will be presented at the NASFiC this year. You can find out more about the Detcon1 Awards at <detcon1.org/award>. Nominating is open to the public; the final voting round will be for Detcon1 members only.

2015 WORLDCON UPDATE

Sasquan <sasquan.org>—the 2015 Worldcon to be held 19– 23 August 2015 at the Spokane Convention Center in Spokane WA—has announced that some of their membership rates will increase at the end of January 2014. Child rates will bump up by \$10 and adult rates by \$30. Supporting and YA rates will not change; Kids-in-Tow (valid through age 5 only) will remain free.

WHO WANTS TO SASS SFWA?

The Society for the Advancement of Speculative Storytelling, Inc. <www.sasswritersgroup.blogspot.com> appears to have been set up as something of an alternative to the Science Fiction Writers of America <sfwa.org>, at least for new writers. It may also be a reaction to some of the *sturm und drang* that has occurred at SFWA this past year. SASS recently announced that award winning writer Michael A. Burstein has been named as their first permanent president.

SASS's website says it is "dedicated to encouraging and mentoring aspiring and new writers of speculative fiction" and that it "expressly disavows any socio-political goals while asserting the right of its members to discuss and explore any and [all] subjects in speculative fiction writing."

SPEAKING OF STURM UND DRANG-SMOFS

While talking details would be inappropriate, it's no dark secret that there's strong contention from time to time on the SMOFS email list; perhaps more of late.

At least partially in reaction to that, Colin Harris and others have started a *moderated* email list <con-talk.org> devoted to con running. It does not appear to be intended to displace the SMOFS list, but will clearly be seen as an alternative to it by some. In addition to Harris, the moderators are Eemeli Aro, Warren Buff, Janice Gelb, Laurie Mann, and Patty Wells. All six are well know in fandom and the list includes two ex Worldcon chairs, one ex NASFiC chair, and at least one person who could easily be a Worldcon chair in the near future.

CLARKESWORLD GOES PRO

Clarkesworld (three-time winner of the Best Semiprozine Hugo) has announced they are no longer eligible in this category. One of the eligibility rules is that a semiprozine may not provide a quarter (or more) of the income of any person, which apparently *Clarkesworld* now does for editor Neil Clarke. He also took pains to assure people that he, personally, is still eligible in the Best Editor, Short Form, Hugo category.


The North Alabama Science Fiction Association meets on the third Saturday of each month. (Unless there is a large nearby

Awards Roundup

GAIMAN WINS SPECSAVERS AWARD

In a popular vote, Neil Gaiman's The Ocean at the End of the Lane was named Specsavers Book of the Year for 2013. The award is sponsored by UK eyeglass seller Specsavers and has as its nominees the 10 winners of other awards in various categories. The Gaiman work had perviously won the Audible.co. uk Audiobook of the Year, which qualified it for this vote. It had also been nominated in the Waterstones UK Author of the Year vote. Gaiman's Fortunately The Milk was shortlisted in the National Book Tokens Children's Book of the Year so he could



have been running against himself for the Specsavers BotY. GOLDEN GLOBE AWARDS

The 71st annual Golden Globe Awards <www.goldenglobes. com> (sponsored by the Hollywood Foreign Press Association) were presented during a televised ceremony 12 January 2014. Genre and related works received at least one nomination in almost two-thirds of the movie categories and almost half the TV categories (though that latter was in part due to relational The Big Bang Theory).

Based on the distribution of noms received, a simplistic calculation of the expected value was one TV win and 2.8 movie wins (one of which was a sure thing with all the nominees in the Animated category being genre). It turned out to be a complete miss on the TV side, but movies came in right on target. Here are the genre/related winners:

PEOPLE'S CHOICE AWARDS		

The 40th annual People's Choice Awards were given during a televised ceremony Wednesday 8 January 2014. Some of the genre and related works taking home honors included:

- Iron Man 3 hammered out wins for Movie, Action Movie, and Action Movie Star (Robert Downey, Jr.).
- The Vampire Diaries captured the On-Screen Chemistry (Ian

Somerhalder and Nina Dobrev), Actor in a New TV Series (Joseph Morgan), and Sci-Fi/Fantasy TV Actor (Ian Somerhalder) prizes.

- Gravity dragged down wins for Dramatic Movie and Movie Duo (Sandra Bullock and George Clooney). Bullock also nabbed Movie Actress, Dramatic Movie Actress, and Comedic Movie Actress. Presumably that last one had little to do with her work in Gravity.
- *The Walking Dead* killed in the TV Anti-Hero (Andrew Lincoln) and Cable TV Drama categories.
- *Beauty and the Beast* romanced Sci-Fi/Fantasy TV Show and Sci-Fi/Fantasy TV Actress (Kristin Kreuk) categories.
- Despicable Me 2 was cutest in the Family Movie category.
- Carrie scared up a win for Horror Movie.
- *The Hunger Games: Catching Fire* ate up the Favorite Year End Movie trophy.
- *Supernatural* got some love for TV Bromance (Jared Padalecki, Jensen Ackles, and Misha Collins).
- *American Horror Story: Coven* got the most shivers for TV Movie/Mini-Series.
- Relational show *The Big Bang Theory* won for Network TV Comedy and Comedic TV Actress (Kaley Cuoco).
- Though her win wasn't for a genre work, it's worth noting that Sarah Michelle Gellar (Actress in a New TV Series, *The Crazy Ones*) gave a big shout out to her days on *Buffy the Vampire Slayer*.

Graffiti Critique and a Breached Castle

No Need for a Questing Beast—Chapter 3 by PieEyedDragon

[Editor's Note: PieEyedDragon's adventures in Middle-Earth will resume in these pages later. In the meantime, we take you to another time and location. PED spends less time "on camera" as this adventure develops, but still plays a part.]

A velvet rope surrounds the micro-swamp. An oil painting hangs on the wall near an open window. Across the hallway, I see a little mannish figure floating in the air. It is holding an artist's palette and brush, and painting hair and a mustache on a smarmy-looking statue against the other wall. I guess it takes a bit longer to manifest a dragon, eh! *Oi*! Freddy! Wake up and see what you two have done!

(Sleepy voice): What's all the noise so early?

[Behind me on the wall, the portrait depicts a sleepy looking red-haired young man. He seems to be loosely costumed as an Egyptian mummy over his trousers and shirt. The figure is moving in a lifelike manner, though it is obviously not an electronic display nor projection.]

Fred: *Peeves*! You'll get in real trouble for bringing a dragon into the school. Or, is it real? How'd you do it?

Peeves: You tell me. It came up out of *your* swamp and spoke to me.

Fred: Really? Not part of *our* spellwork. Say (looking me over), are you an Animagus? What are you doing in Hogwarts?

PED: Is that where I am? Never heard of the place. I was looking for a lake hereabouts and got sidetracked.

Fred: Well, look out the window. The Black Lake is just south of the castle here.

(I look out as directed, and see an expanse of water that shimmers a bit in my vision before giving up and steadying. I appear to be on the fifth floor of an east wing of a castle. There are piles of construction materials and scaffolding near the base. Further out and to the sides, I can see grassy expanses, gardens, greenhouses, and a stretch of forest.)

PED: I do believe that's it. Thank you so very much. Oh, what is your name, then?

Fred: [It was reputedly wise to not give your right name to a talking dragon, and certainly not anger one with a flat refusal; but, he was really just a reconstructed set of memories] Blimey! Can ya read as well as talk (pointing downward)?

PED: (Looking at the bottom of the portrait frame) "Fred Weasley, born 1 April 1978, died 2 May 1998, Laughing All The Way." (The script changes to) "Reading this aloud grants you a 20% discount on any single transaction at Weasley's Wizard Wheezes." Are you the late Mr. Weasley, then? Call me PED. 
