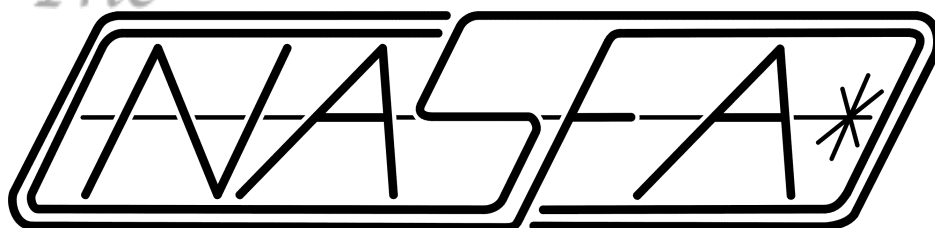

The next **NASFA Meeting** will be **11 March 2017**, at the regular meeting location—the Madison campus of Willowbrook Baptist Church (old Wilson Lumber Company building) at **7105 Highway 72W** (aka University Drive). **PLEASE NOTE** this is a week earlier than the usual weekend due to a conflict with Huntsville Comic & Pop Culture Expo.

CHURCH/MEETING LOCATION IS MOVING

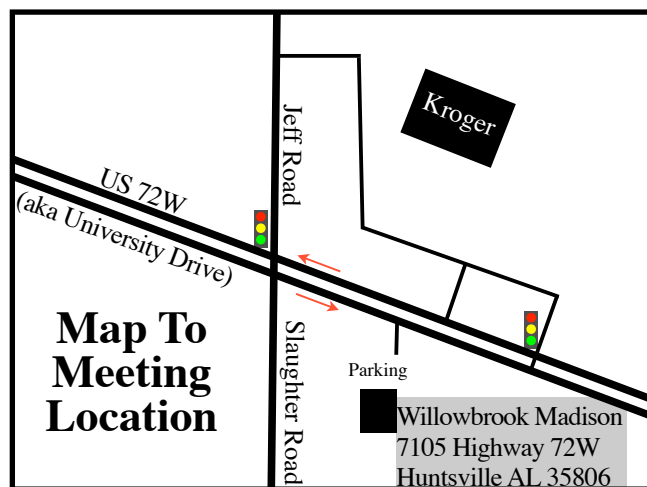
The Madison campus of Willowbrook Baptist Church will be moving before the end of March 2017. We do plan to continue meeting at the church both before and after their move.

FUTURE CLUB MEETING DATES/LOCATIONS

HUGO NOM DEADLINE REMINDER

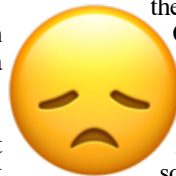
The deadline to vote in the nominating round of the 2017 Hugo and Campbell Awards <www.worldcon.fi/wsfs/hugo> is

11:59P Pacific Daylight Time on 17 March 2017. Members (as of 31 January) of this year’s Worldcon (Helsinki), last year’s Worldcon (Kansas City), or next year’s Worldcon (San Jose) are all eligible to nominate. You can vote either online (using the custom web link you should have received by email) or by printing and mailing a paper ballot <www.worldcon.fi/files/hugo_nominations_letter.pdf>. Members receiving paper publications should have gotten a ballot in the mail.

Finalists are expected to be announced in April 2017. The voting deadline for the final round will be announced later, but is expected to be mid-July 2017.

GROWL, SNAP, BARK, BITE

Semi-sentient GamerGate apologist Vox Day has again revived his Rabid Puppies drive for (or, perhaps one should say, against) the Hugos. His tactic has changed, though, slating only one or two items in most categories. Many of his picks are either by Vox Day himself or associated with his Castalia House publication tentacle. WINDHAM-CAMPBELL PRIZE HITS SLIPSTREAM

Genre-related author Erna Brodber has been named one of the winners of the Windham-Campbell Prize <windhamcampbell.org>—which come with a \$165,000 honorarium. There will be an awards ceremony during this year’s Windham-Campbell Festival, to be held 13–15 September 2017 at Yale University in New Haven CT.

SF HoF NOMINATIONS SOUGHT

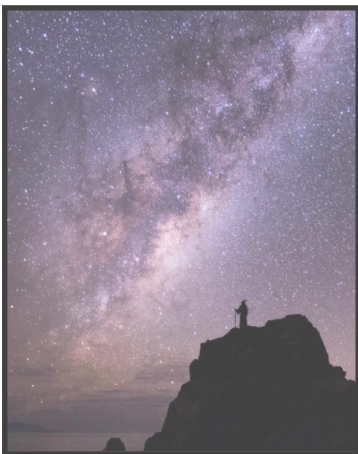
Nominations are being sought from the public for next year’s class of inductees into the Science Fiction Hall of Fame <www.

SOME LOVE FOR DS9

There’s a crowdfunded (Indiegogo) effort afoot to make a Star Trek documentary—but about a series you might not have expected.

What We Left Behind—which would be perhaps the first documentary devoted to *Star Trek: Deep Space Nine*—has well surpassed its original goal (about \$150K), several stretch goals, and was last seen to be within striking distance of the final \$500,000 stretch goal. And, that’s with the better part of a week to go in the fundraising period.

The documentary would be directed by Adam Nimoy and produced by Ira Steven Behr (who was one of the producers for much of the series) and David Zappone.

The February meeting of the North Alabama Science Fiction Association was called to order on Saturday, February 18, 2017, in the Madison satellite location of Willowbrook Baptist Church at 6:30:11P by President Mary Lampert. Mary shook the crickets to amuse baby George.

OLD BUSINESS

The Madison branch of Willowbrook Baptist Church where we usually meet will be moving to a new location March 26. The March meeting will be the last one held at the old location. The club picnic will replace the April meeting. The May meeting will be held at the new church location.

Dues are still due. Membership in NASFA is \$25 for one person, and \$6 for each additional family member at the same address.

NEW BUSINESS

We had three guests, Katie, Delaney, and Danny. Katie and Delaney were there to work on a project for English class, and Danny was visiting various groups around town looking for new activities. He could be in danger of getting volunteered for something because Mike S. commented that, “he wants something to do.” Other people around the room introduced themselves.

According to co-Programming Director Judy, March’s program will be a game of Fannish Family Feud. (Don’t forget that the March meeting will be a week earlier than usual.) April’s meeting will be the picnic at Sam and Judy’s house starting at 2P on April 15. May’s meeting will be held at the new church location, but we don’t yet have a program planned for that meeting.

CON BUSINESS

According to co-con chairs Judy and Sue, they finally have a hotel contract. Con†Stellation XXXV: Horologium will be held October 13-15, 2017. In other words, it will start on Friday the thirteenth.

Confirmed guests are Mary Robinette Kowal as our Guest of Honor, David O. Miller as our Artist Guest of Honor, and Toni Weisskopf as our Master of Ceremonies. [A few other are also confirmed now, and have been posted on the website. -ED]

This will be our last Con†Stellation, number 35. It will be held at the airport hotel.

One issue came up at the concom (convention committee meeting) earlier that afternoon. The club has three bank accounts, one for NASFA, one for Con†Stellation, and a merchant account used by PayPal and the credit card readers. Will we want to just close out the convention and merchant accounts some time after Con†Stellation XXXV? Mike K. said it’s a good idea. Note that each of the two accounts we would close requires a \$1500 minimum balance to stay open.

Sue moved that we will close the convention and merchant accounts some time after Con†Stellation 2017, and Mike S. seconded.

There was other discussion about whether the merchant account will be difficult to reestablish if we ever bid for another convention like DeepSouthCon in the future.

Doug moved that we amend the motion so that the accounts will be closed at the Treasurer’s discretion, and Sam seconded. The amendment passed many to three. One of the objecting votes was baby George, who suddenly cried when we called for a vote. The motion as amended passed many to three.

In summary, we will close out the convention and merchant checking accounts some time after Con†Stellation 2017, at the Treasurer’s discretion.

According to Sam, two postcards we mailed out promoting last year’s convention only just bounced last week.

Sam moved to adjourn at 6:50:06P.

The February program was an appearance by author Travis Taylor, who read a chapter from *Moon Beam*, the young adult novel he is currently co-writing with Jody Lynn Nye. The After-the-Meeting Meeting was hosted by Mary and Doug Lampert at the meeting location.

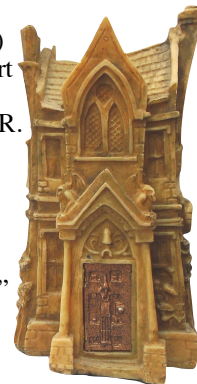

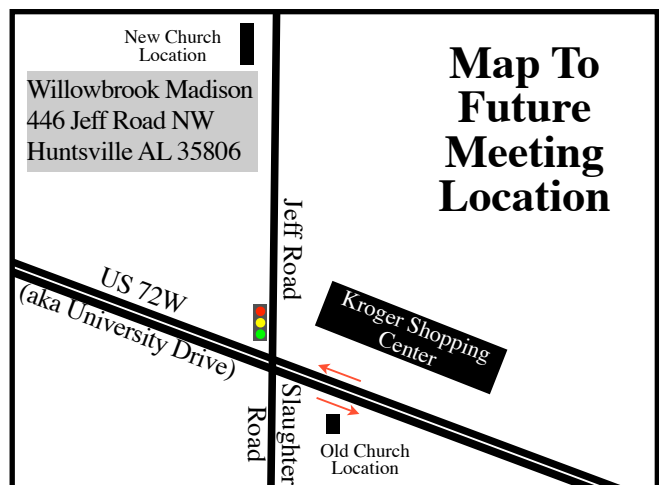

for the CSFFA, I can reveal without trouble that the Aurora Award cycle will start up next month. The CanConvention, where the Auroras will be given out, will be in Halifax, Nova Scotia.

[Too many cons, Lloyd? To some extent I agree with that premise. *But*, setting aside any differences specific to professional cons for now, it's worth nothing that there are many more people who are—let's say fan-adjacent rather than fans *per se*—than there were in past decades. That potential audience creates the temptation to create more and more conventions (fan-run or professional) but it may also limit the percentage of those people willing to work in a volunteer capacity. The economics of conventions varies a *lot* by size and type. For instance, there is an ongoing argument that Worldcon, at a few thousand people, is at an inherently awkward size at least for Worldcons in North America. It's large enough to require—in most instances—expensive convention space (like a convention center) but small enough to not be able to amortize that expense over enough people. Other—but not entirely dissimilar—economic constraints appear at other size points. If one then dilutes the volunteer pool by drawing in more fan-adjacent folks and by having more conventions each year, that both drives up costs (by having to hire some efforts that could have been done by volunteers before) and exhausts the volunteer pool. (I should note that economics play a notable part in NASFA's decision to make this year the last Con+Stellation, but *not* particularly for the circumstances outlined above.) Well, enough venting about that. For the 2017 FAAn Awards, I see that the process was changed. The nominating pool was limited (making it more like a large jury than a popular award) but voting among the nominees will be open to fandom at large—and there will be a write-in slot in each category. (See both <corflu.org/Corflu34/faan.htm> and page 7 of the PDF <corflu.org/Corflu34/Corflu34-PR1.pdf> for details.) As I write this, the nominating round just closed so I should keep an eye out for the final ballot any time now, I suppose. {EDIT: Since I originally typed this reply, the ballot has been released.} As far as Fan Fund support, I've sent a few dollars the way of both TAFF and DUFF (along with a vote in each) and a smaller donation to GUFF (sans vote, since I don't have a continental tie there). I suppose I'd consider some minor financial support for CUFF (assuming it still exists and despite the lack of a national tie) but have no idea where to send money. There was talk several years ago of trying to create a fan fund for an exchange between DeepSouthCon and Westercon, but nothing ever came of it. -ED]





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
