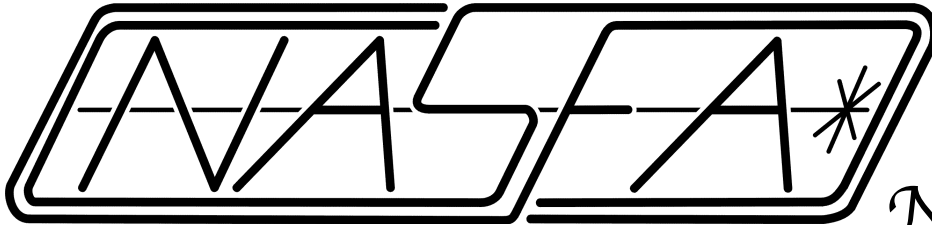

Please note that we expect elections for NASFA Officers to take place **at this NASFA Meeting.**

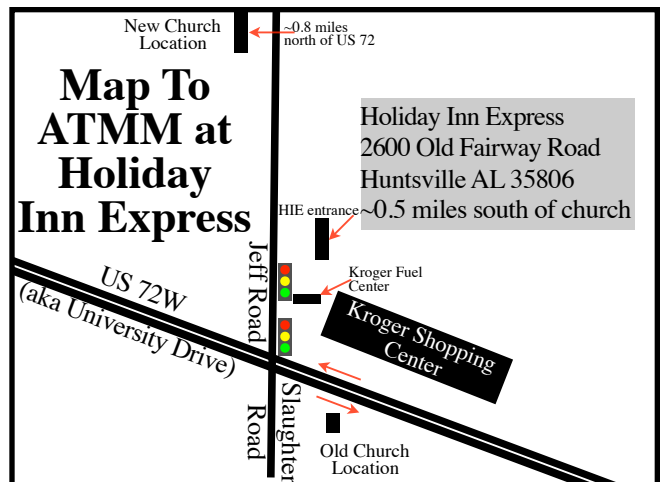
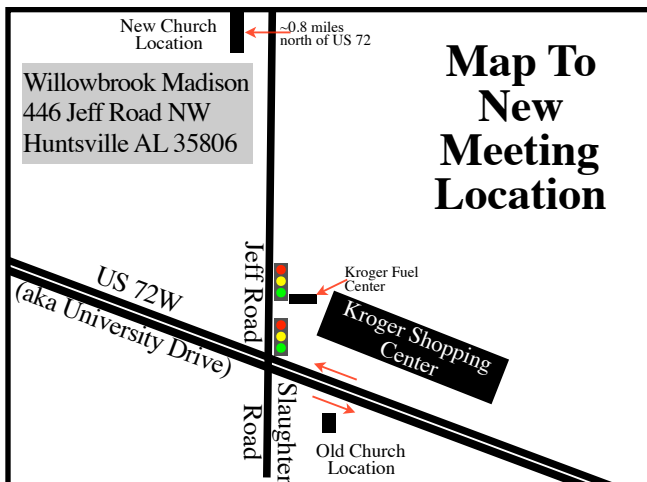
NOVEMBER PROGRAM

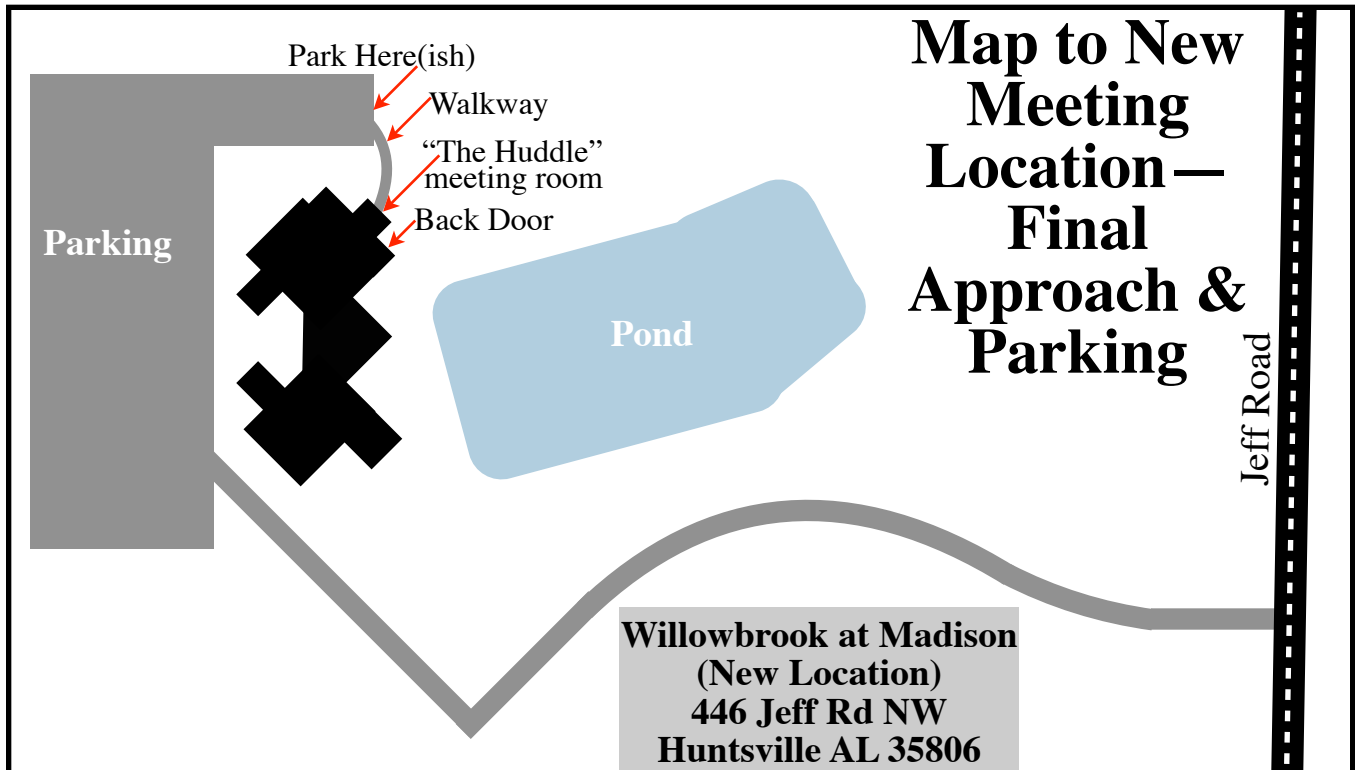
WORLDCON 76 PR

Progress Report 1 for the 2018 Worldcon has been published (linked at <www.worldcon76.org/entry/progress-report-1-is-here>) along with some errata for the printed version (linked from the same URL, but corrected in the online version). The con will be held 16–20 August 2018 at the McEnergy Convention Center (and nearby hotels) in San José CA.

You’ll find a lot of information, including a map and description of their contracted hotels—reservations are expected to open “later this fall.” Other info includes the usual write-ups on the Guests of Honor, how to become a Worldcon member, expected exhibits, early programming & events info, and more.

MORE (RETRO) HUGO UPDATES

Info has been added to the official Hugo Awards page for the 1951 Retro-Hugo Awards (presented by the 2001 Worldcon in Philadelphia) <www.thehugoawards.org/hugo-history/1951-retro-hugo-awards>. Uber-fan Mike Glycer tracked down a copy of the detailed nominating and final results—a PDF of which is



now linked from near the bottom of the website linked above.

Shuttle readers may recall that additional Hugo info had just surfaced for both 1989 and 1956 as of our previous issue. Perhaps there are even more relevant Hugo/Retro-Hugo facts out there just waiting to be (re)located and documented.

DOCUMENTS UPDATED FOR 2017/2018 WORLDCONS

Documentation from the Business Meeting of the 2017 Worldcon in Helsinki—including business passed forward to the 2018 San José convention—are in the process of being uploaded to <www.wsfs.org/rules-of-the-world-science-fiction-society>. The updated Constitution is there (reflecting amendments ratified in Helsinki) as are the Minutes of the 2017 Business Meeting (plus links to videos of the same), updated Standing Rules, and a list of the aforementioned Business Passed On to 2018. At this writing, an updated version of the Resolutions and Rulings of Continuing Effect is still in work by the WSFS Nitpicking & Flyspecking Committee.

STEPHANIE OSBORN'S LATEST BOOK AVAILABLE

The fourth book of Stephanie Osborn's <www.stephanie-osborn.com> Division One series—*Tour de Force* <www.amazon.com/Division-One-Force-Stephanie-Osborn-ebook/dp/B075BR4D8H/ref=asap_bc>—is now available from Chromosphere Press in both ebook and trade paperback format. At least two more Division One books are already in the pipeline (*Trojan Horse* and *Texas Rangers*) with more planned.

WHOSE WRITING) DO YOU LOVE?

Calling itself “The Tourist Map of Literature” <www.literature-map.com>, this website will take the name of your favorite writer and produce a clickable “map” of other writers also liked by fans of the author you input. The closer the name is to your fave, the more liked he or she is by people with the same input. In honor of the Heinlein-related story that follows, the *Shuttle* presents a screen grab of the map for him. Caution: the larger the window you use (a small one was used for this example) the more writers' names will appear... further from the key name, of course.



YOUTUBE RED RUNS HEINLEIN-BASED SERIES

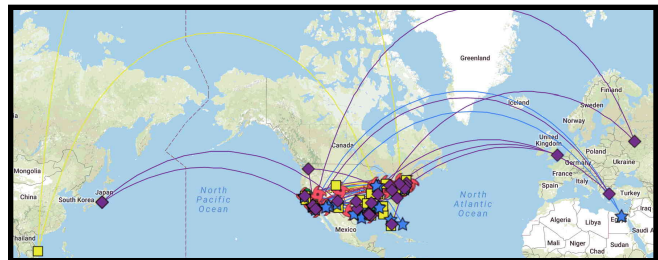
YouTube's subscription service YouTube Red has premiered *Lifeline*—based loosely on an early Heinlein short story <[en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Lifeline_\(web_series\)](http://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Lifeline_(web_series))>. The first episode is available free at <www.youtube.com/watch?v=Ru4zkxNuJ_I>. The 8-part season should have just wrapped up when this issue of the *Shuttle* is published—so you'd presumably be able to binge watch it (if you are a YouTube Red subscriber).

OWN PIECES OF SF HISTORY

The iconic Robbie the Robot suit (first used in *Forbidden Planet*)—along with his “Jeep” from that movie and an alternate head—are going on the block at auction house Bonhams <www.bonhams.com/auctions/24465/lot/1070>. The hammer will fall 21 November 2017 on this and other bits of movie and TV history. The “TCM Presents...Out of This World!” auction includes many other genre items, such as a Superman costume from the George Reeves *Adventures of Superman* (1952–58). As for Robbie, if you have to ask how much you probably can't afford him. The Superman costume carries an estimated price of \$100,000–150,000. The Robbie lot simply notes “Refer to department for estimate.” In dollars, that translates to “\$Yikes!”

GO TAKE A LEAP

Fans of Quantum Leap (1989–1993) will want to check out all the leaps made by character Sam Beckett (Scott Bakula) placed on a single zoomable, clickable map <specialrequest.media/Oh-Boy>. Stops along Sam's “route” are color/shape coded by season. Clicking on each one pops up a box with info about the episode including what his mission was at each place/time. Most of the waypoints are linked to the preceding and following leap locations. The mapping was done by Josh Jones with text from *QL*'s creator Donald P. Bellisario.



VOTE IN GOODREADS CHOICE AWARDS 2017

Online voting for these annual awards is open at <www.goodreads.com/choiceawards/best-books-2017>. As this is being written, they are in the semifinal round, but that will close before this issue is published. The final round of voting will be open 14–27 November 2017 with 10 books in each category.

There are 20 categories, but *Shuttle* readers will probably be most interested in the Fantasy, SF, Horror, Graphic Novels & Comics, and YA Fantasy categories. Genre works will also likely appear in other categories including (but not limited to) the Middle Grade & Children's and Picture Books categories.

Winners will be announced 5 December 2017.

ODYSSEY ONLINE WRITING WORKSHOPS

Three live online writing workshops are being offered by the Odyssey Writing Workshops Charitable Trust <www.odysseyworkshop.org> early in 2018. Application deadlines vary, but start as early as 7 December 2017, so interested parties should act quickly. It costs \$10 to apply, which is applied to tuition if you are accepted. Unsuccessful applicants “will receive feedback on your writing sample.” Full details and a link to the application form are available at <www.odysseyworkshop.org/online.html>.

GENRE BOOKSTORE FUNDS NEW HOME

Borderlands Books <borderlands-books.com> has announced it raised \$1.9 million within its community—sufficient to proceed with the purchase of a new building as a permanent home. The money raised is structured as a loan from a total of 49 people. The sale has not yet closed; that's scheduled for 15 November 2017. The move to their new digs will be sometime in 2018—or the owner may look for a short-term lessee for the new building and continue in his existing location until closer to the end of his current lease.

ANOTHER CHAIN BITES THE DUST

North-central US bookstore chain Book World is folding. In a Halloween announcement the chain said they would be “closing all its stores because of poor sales and online competition” <www.brainerddispatch.com/business/4352441-closing-books-book-world-close-all-its-stores-and-liquidate-inventory>.

While the chain only boasted 45 locations, it represents one more, er, brick in the, um, wall of failing bricks-and-mortar retail.

AMAZING STORIES & NBC KISS AND MAKE UP?

After a public feud—most notable for public statements by *Amazing Stories* <amazingstoriesmag.com> rights holder Steve Davidson—NBC seems to have acknowledged that they actually have to pay for the rights in order to make a new anthology

TV show based on *Amazing Stories*. Negotiations appear to be back on to do just that. A recent blog post by Davidson says he hopes to apply some of the money he'd receive to resume publication of new fiction in the online 'zine. He is soliciting ideas from readers on what they'd like to see.

TZ RISES AGAIN—MAYBE

Gizmodo's io9 reports <i>io9.gizmodo.com/1820092112</i> that actor/writer/producer Jordan Peele (*Get Out*) is working with CBS All Access on a possible reboot of *The Twilight Zone*. There is placeholder info on IMDb <www.imdb.com/title/tt2583620> that indicates this incarnation of TZ could be in mini-series format. Further details are behind their IMDbPro paywall.

MOOTED OMNI REVIVAL HITS NEWSSTANDS

The *Shuttle* reported a few months ago that SF/science mag *OMNI* <www.omnimagazine.com> was moving back under the umbrella of Penthouse Global Media with plans to (re)launch a print edition. The first quarterly paper issue has now appeared, with Pamela Weintraub as editor-in-chief and Ellen Datlow as fiction editor. The ish includes a new Nancy Kress story, "Every Hour of Light and Dark."

HEMMING AWARD GOES BIENNIAL

The Norma K. Hemming Award (Australian Science Fiction Foundation) will skip 2017 and henceforth be awarded every two years. The award is for "excellence in the exploration of themes of race, gender, sexuality, class or disability in a published speculative fiction work." Works published in 2016 or 2017 will be eligible for the 2018 award.

GAG ME WITH A COURT ORDER—OH, WAIT!

The Ninth Circuit Court of Appeals has lifted District Court Judge Anthony Battaglia's order that put a gag on Salt Lake Comic Con in the ongoing trademark infringement suit filed against them by Comic-Con International (aka San Diego Comic-Con). National media coverage (see, e.g., <www.reuters.com/article/idUSKBN1CW2L5>) seems to mostly skew in favor of the higher court ruling as being both constitutional and upholding common sense.

Now that the gag order is lifted, SLCC plans to try crowdfunding to raise money for both their legal bills (said to be over \$1 million) and to produce a documentary about the case.

ORSON WELLES ON THE AIR

Recordings of audio drama (and some comedy) from various radio shows produced/hosted by Orson Wells from 1938–1946 are now available for your listening pleasure at <orsonwelles.indiana.edu>. Many of these are adaptations of literary classics, including a number of genre works. The very first one, from his First Person Singular series, is a 11 July 1938 performance of *Dracula* <orsonwelles.indiana.edu/items/show/1961>.

NATIONAL TOY HOF INDUCTEES

The Strong's National Toy Hall of Fame <www.museumofplay.org> has announced the three inductees for this year—Paper Airplane, Wiffle Ball, and the board game Clue (kinda, but not *really* genre). Some of the other finalists were more nearly SFnal. They included: Magic 8 Ball, Matchbox Cars, My Little Pony, PEZ Candy Dispenser, play food, Risk, sand, Transformers, and Uno.

Awards Roundup

MACARTHUR GENIUS GRANTS

Winners of the 2017 **John D. and Catherine T. MacArthur Foundation** <www.macfound.org> **Fellows Program** (widely known as “genius grants”) <www.macfound.org/programs/fellows> include two with genre connections among the 24 selectees. Author **Jesmyn Ward** wrote the magical realism novel *Sing, Unburied, Sing*. Opera director/producer **Yuval Sharon** is currently working on an adaptation of the radio version of “War of the Worlds,” to be staged at various LA locations 12 November 2017—just a day after this issue of the *Shuttle* is scheduled to be put to bed.

Each of the Fellows will receive \$625,000 distributed over five years. The grants are famously “no strings attached”—to be used any way each Fellow desires.

MAN BOOKER PRIZE

The winner of the 2017 **Man Booker Prize for Fiction** <the manbookerprize.com> has been announced and is a genre work (though not marketed as such). The winner is *Lincoln in the Bardo*, George Saunders (Bloomsbury). At least two of the other novels shortlisted for the prize were also genre or genre-adjacent—which one could consider unusual for this general literary prize. Saunders took home a £50,000 award for the win in addition to £2500 for having been on the shortlist.

HURSTON/WRIGHT AWARD

The winner of the fiction category for 2017 **Zora Neale Hurston/Richard Wright Foundation Legacy Award** <www.hurstonwright.org/legacy-awards> (for “the best in Black literature in the United States and around the globe”) is *The Underground Railroad*, Colson Whitehead (Doubleday). Awards in other Hurston/Wright categories were not genre related.

WORLD FANTASY AWARDS

ATWOOD CASHES IN ON THE CONTINENT

Margaret Atwood was recently given awards in both Germany and the neighboring Czech Republic. In Frankfurt she

received the 2017 **Peace Prize of the German Book Trade** <www.friedenspreis-des-deutschen-buchhandels.de/445941/?mid=1389283> from the Frankfurt Book Fair <www.book-fair.com/en>, which included a €25,000 award. Within just a few days time she was in Prague—only about 5 hours away by car—receiving the 2017 **Franz Kafka Prize** <www.franzkafka-soc.cz/cena-franze-kafky> (for “authors whose works of exceptional artistic qualities are found to appeal to readers regardless of their origin, nationality and culture”). The award from the Franz Kafka Society included a \$10,000 prize.

PRIX UTOPIALES AND OTHER AWARDS

Winners of the 2017 Prix Utopiales and other awards were announced at the Utopiales Festival <www.utopiales.org>, held 1–6 November 2017 at La Cite des Congres de Nantes (convention center) in Nantes France. Most of the works were published in French (and thus of limited interest to most *Shuttle* readers) but some were translated from other languages (including English). Many of the awards included cash prizes. Awards were also presented in game and film categories. The written fiction winners are:

ASTRID LINDGREN AWARD NOMS
