FUTURE ATMMs



HUGO VOTER PACKET AVAILABLE

Members of this year's Worldcon (Worldcon 76 <www. worldcon76.org>, to be held 16-20 August 2018 at the McEnery Convention Center in San José CA) may now download the 2018 Hugo Awards Voter Packet. The packet contains much of the short fiction (short stories, novelettes, and novellas) and selections of works in other categories including several full-length works. Convention members can retrieve it by category (as zip files) at <www.worldcon76.org/hugo/packet.php>. There is a link on that page to look up your membership number and PIN.

A similar 1943 Retro-Hugo Voter Packet is said to be in preparation.

GUFF TRIP REPORT

2017 Get Up-and-over Fan Fund winner Donna Maree Hanson has published a 62-page Trip Report covering her travels to Worldcon 75 in Helsinki Finland-26,000(!) words plus photos. It is available in electronic form via Hanson's website at <donnamareehanson.com/guff-trip-report> for a minimum contribution of \$AUD7 (payable by PayPal). All proceeds go to support GUFF.

WORLDCON & NASFIC SITE SELECTION

Site Selection ballots for both the 2020 Worldcon and 2019 North American Science Fiction Convention are available as printed ballots (in Worldcon 76's Progress Report 3) and as PDFs on the Worldcon 76 website <www.worldcon76.org/ wsfs/site-selection>. Voting is open at the con or, if you mail/ email a ballot it must be *received* no later than 11 August 2018.

WSFS rules require that Site Selection voting be done only on printed ballots (hand delivered, mailed, or onsite). That said, San José (the administering Worldcon 76) has an available workaround approved by the bids on each ballot, for which keep reading.

Recall that voting in Site Selection requires that you be a member of the administering con (San José) and that you pay an Advance Supporting Membership fee for the election in which you're voting. That gives you a Supporting Membership in whatever con wins the bid whether you voted for that bid or not. In this case, there are two elections with separate fees-for the 2020 Worldcon (\$50) and the 2019 NASFiC (\$30).

You can still vote by mail or at the con (or have someone hand deliver your vote to the con). But, if you want to do it all electronically you can use links at the URL above to purchase a "Voting Token" in a given race then enter the ID number for that token either on a paper copy of the ballot you subsequently scan, or directly on a PDF (doing markup in your preferred application). You then email the completed electronic copy of the ballot to Worldcon 76. San José will print the ballot at their end and enter it into the pile of paper ballots to be counted.

Whew... but it can save writing a check or buying a money order, printing the PDF, finding and addressing an envelope, finding or buying a stamp, and hoping the Post Office delivers the ballot in time if you're cutting it close.

Voting this time around may be simpler in the sense that both races are uncontested. The sole 2020 Worldcon bid is for New Zealand, which proposes to hold the con 12-16 August 2020 at several facilities in the same general part of Wellington NZ. On the NASFiC side, a Utah bid proposes to hold the 2019 con in conjunction with the existing Westercon 72 on 4-7 July 2019 at the Davis Conference Center and the attached Hilton Garden Inn in Layton (Ogden area) UT. Various filing papers for both bids can be found at the Worldcon 76 URL above.

SHIMMER PROGRAM WINNERS TO VISIT CHINA

The Shimmer Program has been selecting Chinese fans to travel to Worldcon for a couple of year. Now they have selected a pair of recipients for their Two-way Exchange Fund to visit China. The recipients were selected by Yang

in Helsinki last year. Mihaela Marija Perković (Croatia) and Pablo M.A Vazquez (Puerto Rico, USA) will each receive 15,000 RMB (which is intended to cover economy air fare and hotel cost) and assistance planning the trip.

DR. SEUSS ENTERPRISES V. COMÍCMIX-REMIXED

There's been some movement in the lawsuit between ComicMix and Dr. Seuss Enterprises over the former's desire to publish the crowdfunded mashup cum satire Oh, the Places You'll Boldly Go!. Seuss had filed suit on both copyright and trademark grounds in late 2016. The trademark portion was dismissed but later reinstated on a slightly different theory. It has now been re-dismissed based on yet another new theory, applying a recent ruling between Fox and record company Empire Distribution over the Fox drama Empire.

The copyright part of the suit continues. RÔMANTIC TIMES CLOSES

After the better part of four decades, Romantic Times (RT) Book Reviews is shuttering its website and associated convention, the RT Booklovers Convention. RT was a leading source of info on romance books, which genre has an extremely strong crossover with sf/f works-especially in the paranormal area. The front page of the RT site <www.rtbookreviews.com> features a "Letter to Our Readers" from publisher Kathryn Falk about the closing. That letter indicates that their reviews and other material will remain available online for about a year before the site goes dark forever.




