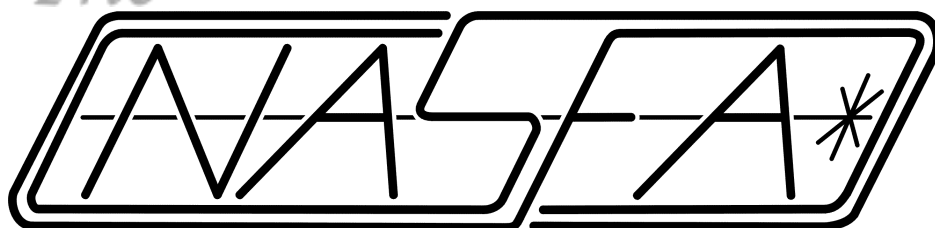

NEW ZEALAND WORLDCON BID FOR 2020 CHANGES DATES

The only active bid for the 2020 Worldcon—NZ in 2020 <nzin2020.nz>—has changed the dates of their bid due to a facilities conflict. The new proposed dates are Wednesday, 29 July–Sunday, 2 August 2020. That's two weeks earlier than

previously announced. This allows them to use the facilities as previously planned rather than losing one of their main venues (and potentially hotel rooms as well) to another event.

The vote for 2020 is being administered by this year's Worldcon (San José). Information about Site Selection voting can be seen at <www.worldcon76.org/wsfs/site-selection>. You must be a member (Supporting or Attending) of the San José Worldcon and pay an Advance Supporting Membership fee to vote in the election. (The fee buys you a Supporting Membership in the winning convention.)

Separately, San José is also administering a vote for the 2019 North American Science Fiction Convention.

RETRO-HUGO PACKET

Worldcon 76 (San José) has released the packet of available fiction (etc.) for the 1943 Retrospective Hugo Awards finalists <www.worldcon76.org/hugo/retro_packet.php>. Members of the worldcon (including Supporting Members) can download the packet. The page includes a link to a "PIN Lookup Tool" if you don't remember your membership number and PIN.

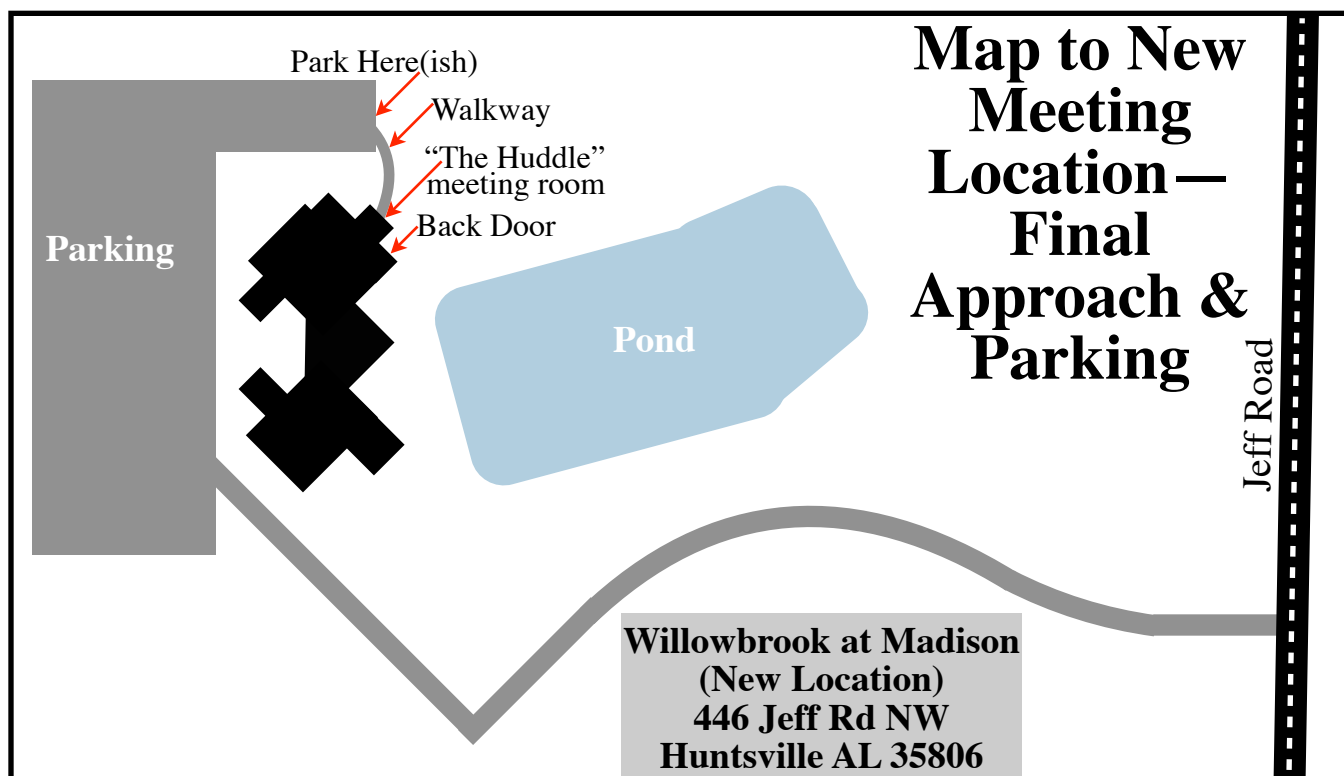
The Retro-Hugo packet includes far less of the nominated material than does the regular Hugo packet (posted earlier). STEPHANIE OSBORN BOOK RELEASE

Local favorite Stephanie Osborn <www.stephanie-osborn.com> has announced the release of the 7th book in her Division One series—*Definition & Alignment*. The ebook is already out (10 July) and the trade paperback will be available on 24 July 2018. She notes that additional installments in the series are scheduled for later this year.

CUFF RESURRECTED, SEEKS NOMINATIONS

After being moribund for a few years, the Canadian Unity Fan Fund has been revived and is seeking nominees to be the 2018 CUFF Delegate. The winner will travel from Eastern Canada to Vancouver to attend VCON 42/Canvention 38 <vcon.ca>, to be held 5–7 October 2018 at the Sheraton Vancouver Airport Hotel.

Full nominations require at least three fan supporters from Eastern Canada and three from Western Canada (six total), a brief fan-related bio, and a statement of how you hope to make this trip beneficial for you and the fan community. Nominations must be submitted by 31 July 2018. Voting will run from 1–24 August 2018 and is open to anyone who has been active in Canadian fandom for two years prior to the Convention. A voting donation of at least \$CAD5 will be requested. This raises money for the travel funds the winner will receive. The winner will be expected to:

- Attend this year's Convention and report back to your fellow fans on the event
- Assist in raising funds for the next year's delegate as they are able
- Administer (with the assistance of a fan from the other side of the country) the process to select the next year's fan delegate
- Promote Canadian genre-related media and fan activities

SLF OLDER WRITERS GRANTS ANNOUNCED

The Winners of the 2018 Speculative Literature Foundation Older Writers Grants <speculativeliterature.org/grants/slf-older-writers-grant> have been announced. J Tullos Hennig and Ann Dávila Cardinal will each revive a \$500 award to "support any purpose the recipients choose to benefit their work."

Honorable Mentions went to Laura Bailey, Sheelagh Brown, Carolyn Charron, Vincent Cxyz, and Kerry Rawlinson.

HEINLEIN SOCIETY SCHOLARSHIPS ANNOUNCED

Recipients of several 2018 Heinlein Society Scholarships <www.heinleinsociety.org/scholarship-program> (each for \$1,500) have been announced. The **Virginia Heinlein Memorial Scholarship** was awarded to **Carson Butler**, a rising junior at the University of Virginia who is majoring in Cognitive Science. The **Jerry Pournelle Memorial Scholarship** went to **Reese Caldwell** who is entering Harvard University, majoring in Chemical

and Physical Biology. The **Yoji Kondo Memorial Scholarship** will go to **Emma Sebesta** who is entering Indiana University Bloomington, working on dual majors in Biochemistry and Spanish, with a minor in Psychology.

DSE v. COMIXMIX CONTINUES

—AND—

THE GRINCH STRIKES BACK

The ongoing legal battle between Doctor Seuss Enterprises and ComixMix over the latter's proposed Trek-Seuss mashup (*Oh, The Places You'll Boldly Go!*) is, well, ongoing. ComixMix is looking for help defraying expenses of the lawsuit and has set up a GoFundMe page <www.gofundme.com/help-us-defend-fair-use-from-seuss> in search of that help. At press time, they'd collected a little over \$2,000 of a \$25,000 goal.

Meanwhile, DSE has lost a different lawsuit which was trying to stop a play named *Who's Holiday!* from being staged <deadline.com/2018/07/raunchy-seuss-parody-whos-holiday-appeal-broadway-1202423264/>. The one-woman play looks at a grown up Cindy Lou Who, who is having a few life challenges (drugs, prison, and living in a trailer park just to name a few). The court ruled the play is a parody and thus fair use.

SHIMMER MAGAZINE CLOSES

Quarterly speculative fiction magazine *Shimmer* <www.shimmerzine.com> has announced that it will close with after the November 2018 issue. Also, the anthology for 2018 will be released late this year.

NEW STOKER CATEGORY

The Horror Writers Association <horror.org> has added a new category to the Bram Stoker Awards effective in 2019 award cycle—Short Non-Fiction. Eligible pieces must be from 2,000 to under 40,000 words and may include “magazine articles, short essays, and academic papers.” Also, an item “must be published in a book (print or e-format), a magazine (print or online), or an academic monograph.” Specifically *excluded* are “personal websites, newsletters, or blogs.”

[I took the briefest glance at the latest issue of *Beam* to appear on eFanzines <efanzines.com/Beam/Beam13.pdf> and they do mention that paper copies are very limited beginning with issue 9, and thus “primarily intended for contributors.” But since they *are* on eFanzines, you can always read it there. For better or worse, the “Gaughan Amendment” is long gone, having been nullified by changes to the WSFS Constitution as decided at the 2007 and 2008 Worldcons (Japan and Denver, respectively). Since the same “can't get a fan and pro nomination in the same year” restriction never applied to, writers or editors, it did seem overly prescriptive. IIUC, the closest to such a restriction (and it's not really close) that currently exists in the WSFS Constitution is to explicitly restrict a given *work* from being a finalist in two different categories even if it qualifies for both. The committee is to choose which category in which to place the work by the number of nominations it received in each. And you're right, of course, that the internet and the way artists (and writers, etc.) use it has changed and will continue to change much about how the results of creative endeavors are disseminated, consumed, and (where appropriate) paid for. It is more than possible that WSFS rules will need to change again (and again) to recognize how those aspects of the world change—but WSFS operates slowly. Part of that slowness is a result of the once-a-year nature of the beast and part is deliberate to keep a single instance of Worldcon from overreacting to what may be a short-term issue. As for the June NASFA Meeting, we did give everyone who was at the May meeting a head's up then that the Cookout/Picnic (which almost always takes the place of one “normal” meeting) would very likely be in June or July, depending on availability of folks doing the program for one of those months. It did, however, turn out to be harder to secure a venue for the Picnic/Cookout than we'd expected. When each possible paid venue fell through, Sue very kindly volunteered her house. Although RT was not a site (or a con) that interested

me, it's certainly true that *many* sf/f fans are fans of romance crossover fiction (and straight-up romances with no genre element, too). Thus, I mourn the loss of the site and the con, though without the personal connection many others would feel. As for Not-A-Con, I don't know that we want it to be a *rousing* success. We hope for enough people to come and enjoy the low-key fun (and pay a membership and even rent a hotel room) that we at least break even financially, of course. But a solid majority of us are within site of the "old fen and tired" stage (I am there already) so—barring an unexpected infusion of new blood—we don't want this to get to be *too* much work. -ED]

If you do make it to London, *et al.*, I can recommend your posited side trio to Edinburgh with a whole heart. Depending on when you are there, Edinburgh has a dozen or so festivals year round but even if you miss them all I found both the city itself and its citizenry delightful on my two visits. One caveat to that—if you are there either during the summer height of festival season or at Hogmanay, you should make accommodation arrangements as early as feasible. Tickets to things like the Military Tattoo might also sell out well in advance. Congrats on the milestone wedding anniversary a d many happy returns for that. As for catching up on reading of genre fiction... that's a goal out of the reach of everyone so I don't have that regret. I do read much less fiction than I'd like to, for which my only excuse is a longstanding news junkie habit. Even that is a rather threadbare excuse; so many of the stories one might read (or watch) cover little new ground whether they be about politics, science, technology, or anything else. As best I can tell, CBS has let nary a peep leak about plans to release *Star Trek: Discovery* in *any* way other than streaming. (Folks buying into video streaming via Amazon Prime can get CBS All Access that way, *but for an additional feel equal to that they'd pay CBS directly* for CBS All Access anyway.) There is speculation that CBS might follow the models set by some other streaming services and do a DVD/Blu-ray release of a given season once the subsequent season is streaming. Maybe, but CBS seems quite determined to leverage people into buying into CBS All Access. {*I hates them, I does.*} As you've heard before now, Lloyd, CUFF is showing some signs of life. There's news they are looking for people to stand for election again (see page 3), though this is just the first step and there's no telling yet how much interest there will be by prospective candidates or voters. -ED]
