
Judy and Sue are always looking for new program ideas, especially if you can run one yourself.

TAFF TO OPEN NOMS RSN; PLUS A TRIP BLOG


On 3 September the Trans-Atlantic Fan Fund Facebook page dropped an announcement that they would soon open nominations for the 2019 West-to-East TAFF race (for a North American fan to go to the Dublin Worldcon) <www.facebook.com/TAFFnews/posts/1969976643023922>. The post reads, in part, "If anybody is considering standing for this, you might want to start lining up potential nominators. You will need two European and three North American fans known to the Administrators this time around."

For this year's TAFF, you can check out Johan Anglemark's trip at his 2018 trip blog taff2018.com. The blog stretches from before his departure from Stockholm (including a stop at Finncon) all the way to the day he was to depart from Oakland International Airport to head home. The trip included stops in Toronto, Minneapolis, Austin (for ArmadilloCon), and Seattle before heading to San José for Worldcon.

1000 YEARS OF FANDOM PROJECT

The Fan History Project <fanac.org> has begun collecting photos of groups of fans, documenting the number of years they have collectively been in fandom. SDCC v. SLCC-THE NEXT ROUND

Shuttle readers may recall that San Diego Comic-Con won their trademark infringement suit against Salt Lake Comic Con late last year, but were awarded only \$20,000 versus the \$12 million sought for damages. SLCC has since changed its name to FanX Salt Lake Comic Convention.

Well, SDCC has now succeeded in getting an order for FanX to pay almost \$4 million that SDCC says it spent in attorney fees and related expenses <www.hollywoodreporter.com/thresq/judge-issues-comic-con-injunction-1137235>. Unsurprisingly, FanX has said it will appeal the ruling.

NEW ACADEMY PRIZE UPDATE

Shuttle readers may also recall that due to #MeToo scandals at the Swedish Academy and the subsequent cancellation of the 2018 Nobel Prize in Literature, The New Academy Prize in Literature stepped in to fill the gap. Four finalists for that prize (to be awarded 12 October 2018) have been announced. Of those, three have genre ties (some stronger than others)—Maryse Condé, Neil Gaiman, and Haruki Murakami. The New Academy will award a prize of 1,000,000 Swedish kroner—SEK (north of \$US100,000). They are running a Kickstarter campaign to rase SEK 250,000 (over \$US25,000) to fund the ceremony www.kickstarter.com/projects/1009951032/ the-new-prize-in-literature-2018>. At press time, they are less than 20% of the way there, but have over a month to go.

Here I sit with July and August issues—and still the looming stacks of other zines that go back to at least last December, but...

[Worldcon 76 didn't post the YouTube link for their Hugo livestream until the middle of the day of the ceremony, if I recall correctly. As I note elsewhere, you can see a replay of the coverage at <www.youtube.com/watch?v=Pt4UI_te7bs>. Note, though, that the first half hour (approximately) is during load-in of the audience. They run a slide loop during that, which is well worth watching once but not worth watching over and over and over for 30 minutes so skip ahead accordingly. I suspect—but do not know—that the more-or-less last minute nature of posting the info is a limitation of their agreement with YouTube who wouldn't want people using bandwidth trying to watch a stream (and refreshing over and over) for an extended period before the stream even started. I'm much more behind than you, Sheryl, on some of the high-profile genre media and less likely to catch up. Retired though I am, I can't seem to find time to watch anything but broadcast/basic cable TV. There are any number of premium TV services and movies I'd love to see but doubt I'll get around to....-ED]

Worldcon 76: Just the Facts

Worldcon 76 (yes, that's their official name) <www.worldcon76.org> was held 16–20 August 2018 at the San Jose McEnery Convention Center in San José CA and the San José Marriott. Their Guests of Honor were Spider Robinson (Author), Chelsea Quinn Yarbro (Author), Pierre Pettinger and Sandy Pettinger (Fans), Edgar Pangborn (Ghost of Honor), Bob Wilkins (gHost of Honor), Frank Hayes (Music), and John Picacio (Art). Picacio was also designated as Toastmaster.

You can find out a lot about the con via the at-con newsletter (*The Tower*), available as PDFs at <www.worldcon76.org/publications/publications-overview>. The only attendance total immediately available to the *Shuttle* is from Kevin Standlee, who noted on LiveJournal a "warm body" count of 5,440—that is,

there were that many individual people there at some point during the con. That doesn't count no-shows with Attending Memberships, or people with Supporting Memberships.

Leading up to the convention, one of the more, um, interesting con-adjacent state of affairs was the promise by a coalition of alt-right-groups to stage a protest on the plaza outside the convention center. This included a "San Jose National March Against Far-Left Violence" plus counter-protest groups for it. Also in the mix, genre writer Jon Del Arroz was promoting a sub-event he termed a "Rally For Freedom And Anti-Discrimination Demonstration At Worldcon 76 San Jose." His particular bugaboo is his claim of mistreatment by the convention (who cancelled his membership after he threatened to disrupt various aspects of the con) and a claim of pedophilia among... well, it's not entirely clear who the supposed pedophiles are.

As it turned out, the whole thing was a bit of a bust. Very few protesters apparently showed up—one estimate was around 40. It's not clear to the *Shuttle* how many counter-protesters were there, but apparently there weren't many in that group, either.

In any case, the sides were kept separate by police. Del Arroz was a no-show, having canceled (via his website and Twitter) due to family health reasons. (The various wildfires in the area left the air rather smoky, which his son could not tolerate due to a lung condition.) It would appear that the pinkshirted con members who volunteered to walk with people who were afraid of being hassled didn't have much to do in that regard. The convention itself went on with little or no notice of the minor brouhaha on the plaza.

The two *required* elements of a Worldcon are presenting the Hugo Awards and having a Business Meeting. Each of those is covered in separate articles in this issue (as are a plethora of other awards and the Site Selection results plus upcoming Worldcons and Worldcon/NASFiC bids in their own articles). Beyond that, a Worldcon is a multi-headed beast. (Or a Big Tent, in another oft-used metaphor.) Results of the Masquerade and Art Show Awards are covered, albeit briefly, in the aforementioned wrap-up of awards given at Worldcon. There were

almost 1000 scheduled items with over 500 program participants... and that doesn't really take into account the fixed events like the Art Show, Con Suite, Dealers Room, Exhibits, Teen Lounge, and more.

Sadly, the *Shuttle* had no on-site reporter this year, but info was sought from numerous sources, much of which is summarized in other articles in this issue. Some of the sources consulted—and others we sadly didn't have sufficient time to closely pursue—are shown in the box above. Go forth and see/read about some of the many rings inside the Big Tent.

Worldcon 76: Hugos, Retro-Hugos, Etc.

One story from the Hugos deserves special mention here. Mike Glyer was not at the ceremony for his Fanzine win—he was in the hospital having fallen ill. (He's fairly well recovered now, after having a pacemaker implanted.) He did send an acceptance speech. [Personal aside: In that speech he thanked contributors to File 770 <file770.com>, including your currently not-so-humble editor. I whooped out loud, all alone in my living room, watching the live coverage and hearing my name mentioned on the Hugo stage. -ED]

His designated acceptor was Jo Van Ekeren, but all did not go smoothly to get her there. She'd spent much of her day with Mike in the hospital, and broke her arm on the way from the ER back to the con. She pushed through, went to the Hugos, accepted the award for Mike, and went to the Hugo Losers Party afterwards—all before seeking treatment. Now that's a trooper. Mike's speech also stated that he was withdrawing from all future consideration for the Fanzine or Fan Writer Hugos.

2018 HUGO AWARDS, WORLDCON YA AWARD, AND CAMPBELL AWARD

Winners of the 2018 Hugo Awards, John W. Campbell Award for Best New Writer, and the World Science Fiction Society (WSFS) Award for the Best Young Adult Book were announced on Sunday 19 August 2018, at the 76th World Science Fiction Convention.

The ceremony was live-streamed by Worldcon 76. You can see a replay of the coverage at <www.youtube.com/watch? v=Pt4UI_te7bs>. The full video runs almost 2½ hours, but the first 29 minutes of that is a repeating set of "pre-show" slides while the audience arrives and is seated. The *Shuttle* particularly recommends you listen to the acceptance speeches by N.K. Jemisin and Rebecca Roanhorse. (In the latter case, her first acceptance speech of two that night.)

There were 2,828 valid ballots in the final round (2,810 electronic and 18 paper). Detailed nominating and final voting statistics can be seen at <www.worldcon76.org/images/publica tions/2018DetailedResults.pdf>. There's a good analysis of how the votes broke out (e.g., was a given race close or not) by Nicholas Whyte at <nwhyte.livejournal.com/3076473.html>.

Neither the Campbell Award nor the YA Award are Hugos though both use the Hugo voting rules. The Campbell is sponsored by Dell Magazines and administered by Worldcon on their behalf. The YA Award is a Worldcon (WSFS) award, but not a Hugo. Starting in 2019 it will be known as the Lodestar Award.

Worldcon 76: Site Selection and Future Cons/Bids

Members of each year's Worldcon have the opportunity to vote in Site Selection for the con to be held two years later. There is what is colloquially known as a Voting Fee but is better termed an Advance Supporting Membership Fee. One pays, votes, and receives a Supporting Membership in whichever bid wins the rights to run the con-whether you voted for them or for some other alternative.

When Worldcon is out of North America in a given year, there is a vote to select a North American Science Fiction Convention (NASFiC) the prior year. This takes place at a NASFiC if there is one that year, otherwise at Worldcon. As you might expect, there's also an Advance Supporting Membership Fee to vote for the NASFiC site.

This year the members of the San José Worldcon had the opportunity to vote for both the 2020 Worldcon and the 2019 NASFiC. Details follow.

2020 WORLDCON SITE SELECTION

The 2020 Worldcon Site Selection was unopposed, so it's not surprising that Wellington, New Zealand won. There were 726 ballots cast, of which 33 were for No Preference. That left 693

ballots expressing preference, so 347 votes were needed to win. Of the 693 ballots with a preference, 643 had New Zealand as their first choice, cinching a win. The remaining first choice selections went mostly to various joke/ hoax sites—Christmas in Boston 2020 lead the way with 22 votes. A more complete vote breakdown can be seen



in the Sunday morning edition of The Tower (the at-con newsletter) <www.worldcon76.org/images/publications/newsletter/ The-Tower-Edition-7_1.pdf>.

It should be noted that New Zealand was forced to change their dates at pretty much the last minute due to a key facility they had reserved being sniped out from under them. CoNZealand <conzealand.nz> will be held 29 July-2 August 2020 at a fistful of venues in Wellington, New Zealand. Their invited Guests are Mercedes Lackey (Author GoH), Larry Dixon (Author GoH), Greg Broadmore (New Zealand Artist GoH), Rose Mitchell (Fan GoH), and George R.R. Martin (Toastmaster). New memberships range from \$NZ75 (Supporting) to \$NZ370 (Adult Attending). Credits for Pre-Supporting and Voting will be available, but those are not up on their website just yet.



2019 NASFiC SITE SELECTION

The 2019 NASFiC Site Selection was unopposed, so it's not very surprising that Layton UT won. It should be noted, however, that if None of the Above wins a NASFiC vote, there will just not be a NASFiC in the subject year. There were 192 ballots cast, of which 10 were for No Preference. That left 182 ballots expressing a preference, so 92 votes were needed to win. Of the 182 ballots with a preference, 171 had Utah as their first choice, cinching a win. The remaining first choice selections went to various joke sites and None of the Above (7). A more complete vote breakdown can be seen in the Sunday morning edition of *The Tower* (see link above).

Spikecon <spikecon.org> will held 4–7 July 2019, and will be a combined con—including the 2019 NASFiC, Westercon 72 (Western US regional), and 1632 Minicon (for guest Eric Flint's 1632 series). The central facility is the Davis Conference Center which is attached to the main hotel, a Hilton Garden Inn. Overflow hotels are also contracted. There are separate guest slates for the NASFiC and Westercon (but with some overlap), making the situation a bit too confusing to unravel in the *Shuttle*—see the Spikecon website. New Attending Memberships range from \$25 (child) to \$65 (adult). New Supporting Memberships are \$30.

UPCOMING WORLDCONS AND BIDS

The 2019 Worldcon will be Dublin 2019: An Irish Worldcon <dublin2019.com, to be held 15–19August 2019 at Convention Centre Dublin in Dublin, Ireland. Guests of Honour are Bill Burns, Mary Burns, Diane Duane, Ginjer Buchanan, Ian McDonald, Jocelyn Bell Burnell, and Steve Jackson. General hotel reservations will open 9 January 2019. Reservations for those with accessibility needs will open 8 December 2018.



Because the 2020 Worldcon will be out of North America there will be a 2020 NASFiC vote. Because there is a 2019 NASFiC, the vote will be administered by them. At present, the *Shuttle* knows of one 2020 NASFiC bid, for Columbus OH <co lumbus 2020nasfic.org>. They are bidding for the Columbus Hyatt Regency Hotel & Convention Center for 20–23 August 2020.

At present, there appears to be one serious bid for the 2021 Worldcon—Washington DC <dcin2021.org>. They are bidding for the Marriott Wardman Park in DC for 25–29 August 2021 (with some hints the dates could change). The 2021 vote will be at the 2019 Worldcon in Dublin.

The only Worldcon bid known to the *Shuttle* for 2022 is for Chicago IL. At last report, they were still trying to establish what facilities/dates might be feasible/available. (Dates under consideration are from mid-August through Labor Day weekend.) The bid does not appear to have an active web presence but you can see some questions answered at <www.worldcon76.org/images/future/2022plus/Chicago%20in%202022%20 Questionnaire.pdf>. The 2022 vote will be at the 2020 Worldcon in Wellington.

There are three known bids for the 2023 Worldcon. Nice, France has a website <worldconinfrance.org/?lng=en> and in that sense is ahead of the other two bids. Nice is planning to use the city's main convention center, the Acropolis on 2–6 August 2023. The New Orleans bid has been around for a while and is an outgrowth of the failed 2018 bid. (Many organizations will regroup and rebid after a failed attempt.) The *Shuttle* cannot find a web presence beyond a slightly-rebadged version of their 2018 Facebook page <www.facebook.com/NewOrleansWorld con2018>. They are bidding for 23–27 August 2023 at the Hyatt Regency Downtown. The Chengdu, China bid is the newest,

having been announced at San José. The *Shuttle* has discovered that the bid is on Twitter <twitter.com/chengduworldcon>.

For 2024, the sole Worldcon bid so far is for the UK <www. ukin2024.org>. This far out, there are few details other than a declared intent to bid and an indication that Glasgow and London are leading the way as possible sites.

For the 2025 Worldcon, there are two known bidders. There's the US Pacific Northwest (likely one of two downtown Seattle sites) <www.youtube.com/watch?v=nVhjXrPJDkE> and Perth, Australia <twitter.com/Perth_in_2025>. Seattle is looking at mid August 2025 while Perth is slightly less specific, just saying August 2025.

Further out, there is a rumor that Tampere, Finland will be bidding for the 2032 Worldcon. The success of 2017's Worldcon 75 in Helsinki spawned interest in Tampere, with makeshift bid ribbons appearing before Helsinki was over. Tampere is said to be the most populous inland city in any of the Nordic countries.

Worldcon 76: Business Meeting

The 2018 Business Meeting agenda for the World Science Fiction Society (WSFS—the parent organization of Worldcons) was lighter than recent years. There were two changes proposed to the Standing Rules, four Constitutional Amendments that received first passage last year and were awaiting possible ratification, and seven newly proposed Amendments. Then there were the usual Committee Reports and re-authorizations, Financial Reports, and more—some of which is so routine it won't be covered here.

The Business Meeting was recorded on video (as has been the case for several years now). Six recordings, covering the three daily sessions of the meeting, can be seen on the Worldcon Events YouTube channel at <www.youtube.com/playlist? list=PL0oLnkb-s4YfkWpg9LmHgSaj2AeY_JVWi>.

AMENDMENTS SEEKING RATIFICATION

The Constitutional Amendment "What Our Marks Really Are" received first passage last year. It would remove the fixed text listing the WSFS service marks and instruct the WSFS Mark Protection Committee to inform each Worldcon and NASFiC of those marks. It was ratified without debate and took effect at the end of the con.

The Constitutional Amendment "The Reasonable Amendment" received first passage last year. It would change "best efforts" to "reasonable efforts" as regards contacting prospective Hugo finalists. "Best effort" is a legal term of art and can be more difficult/expensive compared to "reasonable effort." It was ratified without debate and took effect at the end of the con.

The Constitutional Amendment "Make Room! Make Room!" received first passage last year. It would remove the "lesser of 5000 words" language from the gray zone between writtenfiction Hugo Award categories, leaving only the "20%" language. The effect is to create a larger gray zone on the Novella–Novel boundary. It was ratified without debate and took effect at the end of the con.

The Constitutional Amendment "Name That Award" received first passage last year. It would name the newly created WSFS Award for Best Young Adult Book (ratified last year and first awarded this year) the "Lodestar" Award. Though there was some debate, it was ratified at this year's Business Meeting by a wide margin. A proposed change to make the title retroactive to this year failed, in large part because all ratified Amendments take effect at the *end* of the Worldcon, not the moment they are ratified. Thus it was impossible to make the change retroactive.

NEW AMENDMENTS SEEKING FIRST PASSAGE

Two of the seven proposed new Constitutional Amendments ("Counting Comics" and "Best Podcast Hugo Award") were stopped in their tracks before significant consideration by being Postponed Indefinitely. The underlying ideas, however, may be taken up by the Hugo Awards Study Committee. The former would have modified the way that noms for overlapping bits of serial stories (in Graphic Story works) are counted in the nominating round of voting. The latter would have changed the name of the Best Fancast Hugo to Best Podcast, broadened the definition in certain ways, and made a few technical tweaks to certain sections of the Constitution. (Part of the intent was to include more items in the category where the pod/fancasts were partially supported by listeners/viewers, but there was concern that "Podcast" could—at least by implication—exclude video work currently included in the "Fancast" terminology.) Improved versions of either or both could resurface next year after the Hugo Awards Study Committee has a crack at them.

The proposed new Constitutional Amendment "Professional and Fan Artist Hugo Awards" would have redefined/refined the Constitutional split between what qualifies one as a Professional Artist or Fan Artist for the purposes of those two Hugos. It would still be possible for different works to qualify a person in both categories. This was somewhat complicated as there was a proposed amendment to the Amendment also on the agenda that would change the overall proposal in the way Professional Artist is defined but not change the overall proposal's recommendations for the definition-to-be of Fan Artist. It should probably be noted that the Business Meeting scheduled debate on this whole thing so that it would not conflict with the business meeting of the Association of Science Fiction & Fantasy Artists, giving members of ASFA a chance to weigh in on this. The debate got rather complicated and in the end the whole megillah was referred to a special committee to report back at next year's Worldcon. Until then, the definitions remain as is.

The proposed new Constitutional Amendment "Remote but Real" would have removed restrictions about remote participation at the Business Meeting (but not require such provisions be made). In the end it was referred to a special committee to reconsider the issues and potentially propose new language next year.

The proposed new Constitutional Amendment "Adding Series to the Series" was a clean-up proposal by the Nitpicking & Flyspecking Committee that adds the Best Series Hugo category to the part of the Constitution that discuses the medium of expression (*e.g.*, electronic vs. printed) of the "written fiction" categories. This should have been done when the Best Series category was added to the Constitution. It passed easily and with minimal discussion. It will go forward to next year's Worldcon for possible ratification.

The proposed new Constitutional Amendment "Comic Books and Graphic Stories" would add "or Comic" to the Best Graphic Story Hugo title (thus renaming it the Best Graphic Story or Comic Hugo). The text of the award description already includes comics. It passed with some debate. It will go

forward to next year's Worldcon for possible ratification.

The proposed new Constitutional Amendment "Notability Still Matters" would restore a version of a previous rule (before the "E Pluribus Hugo" nominating system) that allowed Hugo Administrators to leave items off the "long list" of non-finalist nominees if they had only a small percentage of the nominating votes. The proposal was amended during debate to change the cutoff from 5% to 4%. With that change, it was passed. It will go forward to next year's Worldcon for possible ratification.

STANDING RULE CHANGES

A few changes to the WSFS Standing Rules were proposed and passed. The first requires that any proposed changes to Constitutional Amendments awaiting ratification must be submitted by the same deadline as new Constitutional Amendments. This arose, in part, because a proposed change to the "Name That Award" Amendment—with a different name for the YA Award—was kicked around for a while pre-con. Now "changes to changes" will have to play by the same rules as "new changes."

The second Standing Rule change moves the deadline for submitting new business to 30 days (versus 14 days) before the Preliminary Business Meeting (which is the first daily session of each year's meeting). It was generally felt that 14 days is not enough time to circulate and discuss complex changes before the Business Meeting begins. There has been a trend for more —and more complex—changes being proposed for WSFS rules (including the Constitution) in recent years. Experience has been that circulating and discussing proposed changes before the con begins both makes the daily meetings run smoother and yields less buggy results.

A third Standing Rule change pushed the time limit for reports back to 30 days before the Preliminary Business Meeting to come in line with the new deadline for submitting new business.

FINANCIAL AND COMMITTEE REPORTS

Committee reports were received from the Mark Protection Committee, Nitpicking & Flyspecking Committee, Worldcon Runners Guide Editorial Committee, Formalization of Long List Entries Committee, and the Hugo Awards Study Committee. Several of the proposed new Constitutional Amendments discussed above originated in those reports. All the committees were continued for next year.

Financial Reports to the Business Meeting are required from all Worldcons and NASFiCs until they have expended all funds. [It's a bit more complicated than that, but close enough for our purposes. -ED] Reports were received from at least Anticipation (Montréal; 2009 Worldcon), LoneStarCon 3 (San Antonio; 2013 Worldcon), Sasquan (Spokane; 2015 Worldcon), MidAmeriCon II (Kansas City; 2016 Worldcon), NorthAmeriCon '17 (Puerto Rico; 2017 NASFiC), Worldcon 75 (Helsinki; 2017 Worldcon), Worldcon 76 (San José; 2018 Worldcon), and Dublin 2019: An Irish Worldcon (Dublin; 2019 Worldcon). There may have been others filed, but that weren't in time to make it into the pre-con printed agenda.

OTHER BUSINESS

A proposal to modify the rules about when Worldcons and NASFiCs would have to produce Financial Reports was considered but no resolution was achieved. The concern was that the new 30-day Standing Rule for reports could cause many Financial Reports to be omitted from the printed Agenda. The proposal was referred to the Nitpicking & Flyspecking Committee with instructions to consult with the makers to come up with something that accomplishes what they want without any undesired side effects. The NP&FS Committee will report back on this at next year's convention.
